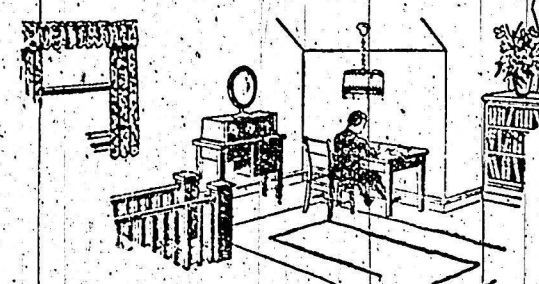

Death of John A. Patton

On Thursday, August 16th, 1923, there passed away at his home at Thornton a well known and highly respected resident in the person of John A. Patton. His death came as a great shock for, although deceased had been in very poor health for the past year and a half, he continued going around until two days before his release. His long illness was borne with great patience.

Mr. Patton, who was in his 59th year, was born in Euphrasia, Grey County, where he lived until twelve years ago when the family moved to Thornton. Thirty-six years ago he married Isabell Curry, who survives him.

He was a member of Trinity United Church, and also of the Masonic Lodge, Cookstown. He always took a great interest in the Agricultural Society, being a director in both the Cookstown and Cookstown societies. His quiet and kindly disposition won him many friends wherever he went.
