Young People's Rally

The annual Rally of the Young People's Union of Grey Presbytery, which was held in Markdale on Friday last week, August 24th afternoon and evening, was a decided success in every particular. Despite the somewhat unfavorable weather in the afternoon a fair crowd gathered to witness the final game for the Ladies' Softball Championship of Grey Presbytery between Dundalk and Durham. The former won by a narrow margin and will hold the shield for the next twelve months.

In the evening a very large audience was present in Annesley Church, and a splendid program was provided. Dr. Anderson, the missionary supported by the Young People's Union, who has been home on furlough, and who leaves for China next month, was present and gave a short address, at the close of which Mrs. Anderson was also called to the platform, and Mr. Chas. Waite of Owen Sound, Missionary Convenor for Toronto Conference, made a short address and Miss E. Bumshead of Owen Sound, on behalf of the Young People's Union, presented Dr. and Mrs. Anderson with a pair of handsome steamers.

In the final Oratorical Contest Miss May Jeffries of Owen Sound, winner of Group No. 3, won the championship of the Presbytery, with Miss Mary Lockhart of Dundalk a close second. Both these young ladies gave excellent addresses, and were highly commended by the judges. The judges were Rev. A. S. Mitchell and Rev. Wm. Coatts of Markdale and Rev. Stotesbury of Kimberley. Mr. Mitchell announced the decision and also gave an excellent criticism.

Another feature of the programme was the final debate on the subject, "Resolved that the extension of the franchise to women has resulted in the moral, social and economic betterment of the country." The Markdale team composed of Messrs. Aubrey Foster and Milton Henry, champions of the southern half of the Presbytery, supported the affirmative. The Anson team, winners of the north, which was to have taken the negative, was unable to come, and the tie was taken by six young ladies from Markdale, namely: Mrs. Milton Henry and Mrs. Mary and Misses H. McArthur, H. Wadden, G. Armstrong and St. John. All the speakers did exceptionally well and the subject was one of the most interesting and important of the evening. Other numbers on the programme were solos by Miss Violet Dean of Owen Sound and Mr. G. A. Deaton of Markdale and a duet by Mr. J. H. Dundas and Miss Blanche Walker. Mr. Howard Graham, Literary, Social and Recreation Convener for the Presbytery, presided.
