Fifty years ago we never heard of such a disease as appendicitis, but then we frequently heard of cases of so-called "colic" which were ofttimes followed by what was then called "in Times Points Out Necessity flammation of the bowels", which almost invariably proved fatal.

The treatment given for colic in those times was almost invariably a sedative of some kind, usually opium or some of the alkaloids of opium such as morphine, heroin or codeine This only served to mask the real condition that existed. The so-called colic was only a symptom of what observations in connection with postmortem examinations revealed subsequently to be what has since been known as "general peritonitis." This general peritonitis was almost invariably the result of a perforated appendix, or of a neglected case of appen-
