WORLD NEWS IN BRIEF

Jas. Dargavel of Rock Mills has purchased the Picrville Fox Ranch.

Messrs. Towns and Gase of Thedford have purchased the Ellis evaporation plant in Meaford.

Coal sheds are being erected in the C.P.R. yards at Durham for the 3 m. Cudler Estate.

Albert Livingston of Durford formerly of Glenrothes has purchased Mrs. J. T. Hendry's general store, Durford.

Hoodlums broke two plate glass windows in Hanover one night last week by throwing sticks of cordwood through them.

Albert Tolson of Owen Sound

has been appointed game warden and fisheries inspector in the place of the late Ralph Ely.

A couple of men who were operating gambling devices at Dundalk Fair were arrested by a Provincial policeman and taken to Owen Sound for trial.

Mrs. E. D. McClocklin died in Toronto on Monday of last week, aged 78 years. She was a resident in Grey County, most of the time in Durham since 1850, excepting the past few years which were spent with members of her family in Toronto.

(115) The Maritime Livestock Market

was reorganized in March, 1927, to

make the market Maritime—chiefly

hogs, lambs and some cattle—for

75,000 members of over eighty clubs

in the three Maritime Provinces.

The report of the first year shows

\$562,237 received for 29,417 lambs,

19,918 hogs, 20 calves and 414 cattle.

An extension to the air express services maintained by the Canadian Pacific Express Company has been announced. A new air-line will be opened early in September between New York, via Albany, and Montreal. Lines are already operating between Rimouski, Montreal and Ottawa.

A name of unusual distinction

will be added to the Canadian Pacific's Royal Family of ocean steamships when the fourth 20,000 ton vessel of the new "Duchess" class is launched in Scotland. She will be named the "Duchess of York," and will be christened by Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York herself. The name "Duchess of York" recently changed from the "Duchess of Cornwall."

BRITISH AND FOREIGN
The Anglo-French pact on naval limitations has been rejected by the United States as a basis of discussion.

The wife of the new Lord Mayor of London, Sir Kynaston Studd, is a Russian, formerly Princess Alexandra Lieven, daughter of Prince Paul Lieven, one time Grand Master of ceremonies at the Imperial Russian Court.

Ability of the customs duty of 8 cents per 100 lbs. on cement was advocated by the Canadian Council of Agriculture before the Advisory Board on Tariff and Taxation, at Ottawa, on September 25.
