COUNTY AND DISTRICT

Jas. Dargavel of Rock Mills has purchased the Priceville Fox Ranch.

Messrs. Towns and Gase of Thorford have purchased the Ellis-ewap-otog in Meaford.

Coal sheds are being erected in the C.P.R. yards at Durham for the Am. Calder Estate.

Mrs. Albert Livingstone of Durham, formerly of Glenora, has purchased the old H. Hendrick's general store in Meaford.

Woodmen broke two plate glass windows in Hanover one night last week by throwing sticks of cordwood through them.

Albert Rolston of Owen Sound has been appointed game warden and Fisheries Inspector in the place of the late Ralph Ely.

A couple of men who were operating gambling devices at Dundalk Fair were arrested by a Provincial Policeman and taken to Owen Sound for trial.

Mrs. E. D. McClocklin died in Toronto on Monday last week, aged 78 years. She was a resident in Grey County most of the time in Durham since 1879, excepting the past few years which were spent with members of her family in Toronto.

The Maritime Livestock Market was organized in March, 1927, to market Maritime livestock—chiefly hogs, lambs and some cattle—for 7500 members of over eighty clubs in the three Maritime Provinces.

An extension to the air express services maintained by the Canadian Pacific Express Company has been announced, and a new air line will be opened early in September, between New York, the Albany, and Montreal. Lines are already operating between Rimouski, Montreal, Toronto, and Ottawa.

A name of unusual distinction will be added to the Canadian Pacific's Royal Family of ocean steamships when the fourth 20,000 ton vessel of the new "Duchess" class is launched in Scotland. She will be named the "Duchess of York" and will be christened by Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York herself. The name being recently changed from the "Duchess of Cornwall."

Despite the dog's of nervous tension the grizzly bear is here attracted by the sight of a huckleberry bush or a stream full of fish. The prospect of a juicy specimen of humanity, and the splendid crop of huckleberries now in British Columbia will probably contribute to a successful hunting season during the month of September and the early part of October.

Fort William, Ontario.—Three grain elevator corporations with large interests at the Head of the Lakes are involved in a merger of several powerful Canadian terminal and elevator companies, the new company being known as the Canadian Consolidated Grain Company. A total of 12,000,000 bushels of elevator capacity will be owned and operated by the new company.

Betty and Buster Bruth, two little black bear cubs, have sailed from Montreal for Italy where they will be presented to the Marquis de Pinedo, the famous Italian round-the-world flier. They are woolly bibles, scarcely larger than a child's toy teddy bear, and of an amiable disposition. They were obtained by Mr. E. Roncarelli of Montreal, through the General Tourist Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and are similar to the little bears sent over by him a few years ago to Mussolini.

The Dominion Government is going in for pigeon breeding with the object of training these birds for purposes of communication. The Department of National Defence is to have charge of the work. The Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for a pigeon-loft manager in connection with the civil Government air operations of the Department of National Defence, to organize and administer a pigeon communication service.

The Canada Goose makes remarkable migratory flights but it is not generally known that civilization has so far affected his habits that sometimes he travels by railway. A pair of wild geese enjoying this modern luxury passed through the Windsor Station, Montreal, under the provincial wing of the Canadian Pacific Express in a specially constructed crate. There are a number of bird sanctuaries throughout Canada and the United States where plighted geese are kept to reassure their comrades that all is safe and secure for them to stop and rest on their flights north and south.

WORLD NEWS IN BRIEF

CANADIAN: Gillespie's grain elevator at Port William was burned on Sunday night with a loss of \$200,000, and 110,000 bushels of grain.

Abolition of the customs duty of 8 cents per 100 lbs. on cement was advocated by the Canadian Council of Agriculture before the Advisory Board on Tariff and Taxation, at Ottawa, on September 25.

A body found on the east shore of Nottawa-waga Bay is believed to be that of Frank Hutchinson, Second Mate of the Mohawc. The inquest held at Owen Sound brought no light on the cause of the sinking of the vessel.

A new Women's College hospital, to accommodate 200 beds, is to be built at the corner of Grosvenor St. and Surrey Place, Toronto, a location convenient for the many students at the University, who are preparing to enter the field of medicine.

A case of the most virulent type of smallpox was discovered on the Indian Reserve near Sarnia last week by Dr. T. P. Bradley, medical officer for the reserve. Vaccination of every resident on the reserve, and the closing of the school and church have been ordered.

It is possible that an air-mail service between the two Americas, including Canada, may be established in the early future. The first official air communication from Mexico City was made with the office of the Mexican Consul-General for Canada, Jose Domingo Fernandez, one day last week.

A giant bell, the replica of the one which has been for three centuries in a church at Dieppe, France, has been received by the Quebec Government for installation in the future Provincial Museum. The bell is Dieppe, called "La Catherine," and is the gift of the inhabitants of their native land to come to Canada.

Amalgamation of five Border City Municipalities—Windsor, Ford City, Walkerville, Sandwich and Riverside into a great city, to be incorporated from Jan. 1, 1930, with a name to be selected by the Governor-General of Canada, is advocated by J. A. Ellis, Director of the Bureau of Municipal Affairs, in a report placed in the hands of the Ontario Government last week.

John Barowski, the Pole arrested for the killing of Thomas Jackson, farmer near Parry Sound on August 1st, is a shooting affair following on a man-of-war and subsequent falling of a motor car, one being killed and the other injured. He was shot to the last that he was not out of the pain that escaped into the woods, and that he is innocent of the crime of shooting the farmer.

On Monday last, the regular air mail service between Toronto and Montreal went into effect. The plane which leaves Leaside, Toronto, at 9:45 a.m., reaches St. Hubert air field at Montreal about 1 p.m. All mail intended to go by airplane must be prepaid at the rate of 5 cents for the first ounce and 10 cents for each succeeding ounce. Special stamps and envelopes are for sale, but when it is impossible to secure them ordinary stamps and envelopes may be used if addressed "via air mail."

Much interest is centered in Edmonton on the case of Vernon Booher, charged with murdering his mother, brother and two hired men on a farm near Mannville, Alta., the theory having been advanced that confession of the deed was made while the prisoner was under hypnotic influence of Dr. Maximilian Langsner, the criminologist who professes to be able to produce the murderer of Ambrose Small, the Toronto Theatre multimillionaire, a few years ago. The Crown must prove that Booher was not under hypnotic influence before his confession can be counted.

Dr. Charles Hose, D.Sc., ethnologist, entomologist, traveller, who discovered oil at Sarawak, the richest oil field in the British Empire is at present in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, following an operation. Dr. Hose was given his degree of Doctor of Science by the University of Cambridge, in recognition of his work in Borneo. Four years ago Jesus College elected him as an Honorary Fellow of the College. Only once before at either Oxford or Cambridge, did such an event happen when Oriol College conferred a similar honor on Cecil Rhodes. Dr. Hose was recently at the International Congress of Entomology at Cornell University, Ithaca. He had come to America as a delegate of the British Empire Forestry Association.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The Anglo-French pact on naval limitations has been rejected by the United States as a basis of discussion.

The wife of the new Lord Mayor of London, Sir Kynaston Studd, is a Russian, formerly Princess Alexandra Lieven, daughter of Prince Paul Lieven, one time Grand Master of ceremonies at the Imperial Russian Court.

A story comes from Hong Kong that 40 Chinese bandits set upon the British steamer Anking, killed some of the officers, robbed the passengers, wounded the Captain, and compelled the Second Officer to take them ashore.

Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang of Manchuria has announced that from now on Manchuria's door will be wide open to foreign capital to be used in developing the country's mines, land, forests and railways, in co-operation with Chinese capital and authorities.

Thomas A. Edison is visiting his friend, Henry Ford, in Detroit. He is to lay the cornerstone of a Ford Museum, a collection in which is to be made up of relics used by Edison in working out his inventions. These have been gathered by Mr. Ford from collectors all over the world.

A wonderful opal, valued at \$10,000, has been found at the gem field of Lightning Ridge, Australia. Roughly dressed it measures 6 1/2 inches by 2 inches, sparkling in colors of red, green, orange, blue and gold. Miners claim the discovery as unique in the history of the gem world.

Princess Chichibu, heir-presumptive to the throne of Japan, was married to a "commoner," Miss Seisun Matsudaira, daughter of Japan's former Ambassador to Washington, at the Imperial Palace at Tokyo on September 27. Always previously the Japanese Princess married women of titled ancestry.

The abolition of Pathala, India, in an interview last week, at Mount-ron, Swize, declared that the majority of the Princes of India are satisfied that British conjection is vitally necessary to India. They seek their constitutional rights, nothing more. Pathala is the premier staff of the Princes, and has a population of 1,000,000. A committee headed by Sir Harcourt Butler is at present inquiring into the relations between the Government of India (British) and the native states. Sir John Simon's commission left London for India on September 27th, for the same purpose. There are 70,000,000 people in India and it is the wish of the British Government to bring a change in the present situation that has been a long time in the country.

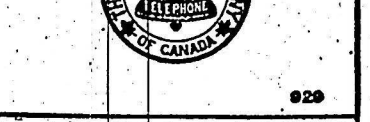
