Care in Covering for Winter Care should be taken not to use leavy manure for covering perennimanure, or even straw or leaves hould be used. Heavy wet manure s almost sure to smother the roots.

There is no better covering than leaves, but the difficulty is to keen them down, should the weather prove dry, with high winds. Brush will do placed over the piles of leaves in a roof-shaped form. Handler still, for many people, is to use the little over the top.

Manure should never be put over bulbs. Unless it is so old that it is just black soil, not manure at all, it is likely in injure the bulbs. Use leaves or straw for winter protection for the bulb bed.
