COUNTY AND DISTRICT

A drainage system is being installed in Clarksburg at a cost of about \$5000.

Thos. Hurst of Loree was pretty badly shaken up when he fell with the hay fork to the floor of the barn.

William Lewis, a resident of Collingwood township since 1874, died at Clarksburg a week ago Saturday, aged 79 years.

D. Campbell of Dundalk had his car badly damaged when hit by another car which was driven on to the highway without stopping.

Seventeen residents of Dundalk and vicinity were fined \$10 each and costs for driving cars without first having obtained permits to do so.

Mr. Forêt's newly paved streets were officially opened Monday of last week. Hon. W. H. Price represented the Government at the celebration.

Mrs. Sidney Banks, a prominent worker in the Women's Institute and in the cause of temperance, died at her home near Shelburne on Wednesday, October 3rd.

Rev. T. J. Charlton, a retired Anglican Minister, passed away at the home of his son, Rev. H. K. L. Charlton in Clarksburg on Monday of last week, aged 71 years.

The first school fair was held in Grey County in 1911, under the direction of Mr. H. C. Duff, then cultural representative, and they have gradually grown in interest with the result that now almost every school in the county takes part. They are under the direction of the Department of Agriculture.

Miss Myrtle Stocks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stocks of Dundalk, won Dr. Jamieson's medal given for the pupil taking the highest marks at the Entrance examinations.

Miss Stocks received the highest marks of any pupil who ever wrote on the Entrance exams in South Grey. The medal was presented at the Championship School Fair in Durham on Saturday last.

The anniversary services in the United Church were held on Sunday last, Rev. Mr. Bartlett of Kilsyth preaching at both services. In the morning he took for his subject "The Need of Religion," in the evening the choir sang the anthem "Gloria Patri" and the Lord's Prayer and a quartette made up of Evelyn Shouldice, Lucia Shouldice, Charlie Kirk and Mabel Hewitt sang "Never to Me Shall I Forget."

On Friday evening a charming shower was held at the home of Mr. John Atkinson, in honor of his daughter, Vera, whose wedding is to take place on Wednesday, October 17th. Mr. Albert Rice being the happy man. A number of lovely and useful gifts were carried in by little Miss Norton and Colin Sutherland, dressed as bride and groom, while Amelia Norton played the wedding march. The gifts were wrapped by Laura Shouldice and Amelia Norton, while Jamie McPherson read the verses. Two silver table spoons were presented by W. L. the President, Mrs. Will Rice marking the presentation, and Mrs. Atkinson reading the address. Miss Atkinson and Mr. Rice very graciously thanked those who had given them the "surprise party" in a few well-chosen words; and afterwards the pleasant time was continued with music, games and refreshments.

WORLD NEWS IN BRIEF

CANADIAN Hon. Jas. A. Robb, speaking in Toronto last week, declared Canada to be on Easy Street financially.

The birth of the new Nationalist Republic of China was celebrated by the Chinese in Kitchener last Thursday night, by a dinner and meeting afterwards.

Announcement that provision for old age pensions would be placed on the statutes at the next Ontario Legislature, was made by Premier Ferguson in Toronto last week.

A drive for membership in the League of Nations was launched in Ottawa last week; also authorization of "model assemblies" similar to the one held in Ottawa, as an experiment last June, was given.

The Boards of Trade and Commerce of Northern Ontario, at their recent Convention at North Bay, adopted the resolution sponsored by Timmins, re building a highway between Timmins and Sudbury.

Dr. Wm. Sherwood Fox is to be installed officially as President of the University of Western Ontario, London, at the special convocation to be held next Friday to mark the fifth anniversary of the founding of the university.

The Sauble Falls Light and Power Co., Warson district, has been sold to the W. B. Foskey Co. of Minneapolis. This company will develop the power along the Sauble River, and bring electricity to points which it has not reached.

De. W. S. Dyer, Provincial Geologist on the James Bay slope, reports coal deposits there; also formations which indicate the presence of oil. He found gypsum at Mogoos River, and fire clays, possibly of use for china making, at Metagamini and Missinibi rivers.

4000 farmers from all parts of Ontario attended the ploughing match on the Carmichael farm, 8 miles north of London, last week. Among prominent people present were Hon. J. C. Elliott, Minister of Public Works, and J. Locke Wilson, Sec. of the Plowmen's Association.

Premier King, speaking at the annual banquet of the Canada Club in London, England, October 10th, on "Immigration and Diplomatic Representation Abroad," declared that Canada wants British immigrants above all others, and is ready to take steps to make such immigration easy.

Prof. J. A. Neilson, Port Hope, an enthusiast in nat. culture, urges that Canada will benefit financially by planting nut trees on Canadian farms and in towns and cities. Canada supplies annually \$5,000,000 worth of nuts, most of which could be grown in the Dominion. He mentions especially walnuts, hickory nuts, hazel nuts and chestnuts, which will grow well in localities suited to them.

The W.C.T.U. in Convention in Toronto last week, set out on a campaign for total prohibition as the only sure solution of the liquor problem. Rev. Henry Carter of London, England, who is on tour through Canada, declared in Toronto last week that the system of Government sale "is about the worst that could be devised. It neither ends the social troubles caused by alcoholism, nor does it put the drink trade out of politics." Mr. Carter was a member of the British Government's Liquor Control Board during the 7 years of its existence, and is now Secretary of the Temperance Council of the Christian Churches of England.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN A succession of earthquake shocks in Mexico last week, caused considerable loss of life and much damage of property.

The British Cabinet, after sitting in council for two hours on Oct. 10, decided to publish in full the provisions of the Anglo-French naval understanding.

THE UNITED STATES Presidential campaign is now in full swing. Hoover is speaking in Boston and New York this week, after touring the South last week. Smith spoke in Tennessee on Oct. 12, and this week is speaking through the Middle West. The Literary Digest's "straw vote" — a feature preceding every election — indicates Hoover as the more popular candidate in the States. Smith is ahead in Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana and South Carolina; Hoover leads in all the rest of the States. New York is out strongly in favor of Smith. Chicago and Philadelphia are for Hoover.

Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. An account was received from the Owen Sound Sun-Times for advertising, \$1.40; Report of John J. Norton, sheep vanner, one sheep killed belonging to D. Morrison, \$12.00; Report from M. J. Farley, sheep killer belonging to Norbert Hamilton, \$30.00; Account from Caundry Iron Co., repairs for tractor, \$1.20.

COMER - PRICE - That the account of the Sun-Times, \$1.40, for advertising be paid; Carried.

HUGHES - PRICE - That by-law 56 appointing a Collector be now read a first time. By-law No. 56 was then read a first time.

COMER - HAWCY - That by-law No. 56 be now read a second and third time, passed and carried. By-law No. 56 was read and passed accordingly.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, November 6th, at one o'clock p.m.

WINDS, AND FLOW TOWARDS BERMU... seeking better weather.

Investigation is being made into the sinking of the French submarine "Ondine", which was rammed and sent down with its crew of 40 men and 3 officers, by a Greek vessel on Oct. 3rd, but not reported by the Greek Captain until Oct. 12th.

Commander Richard E. Byrd left Los Angeles on Oct. 10, for the South Pole, in the giant whaling ship "C. A. Larsen", which is to join 2 other vessels in New Zealand waters, and sail south forming a base from which the airman will fly. The expedition is scientific.

2000 delegates arrived at Great Yarmouth, Eng, last week, for the annual meeting of the Council of the National Liberal Federation, at which Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George was one of the leading speakers. A free-trade resolution was submitted to the delegates, plugging the Liberal party to abolish all protective taxes and take the lead in the world movement of the removal of commercial barriers.

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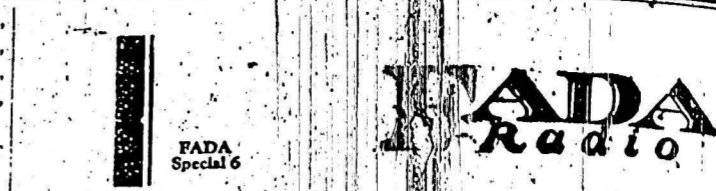
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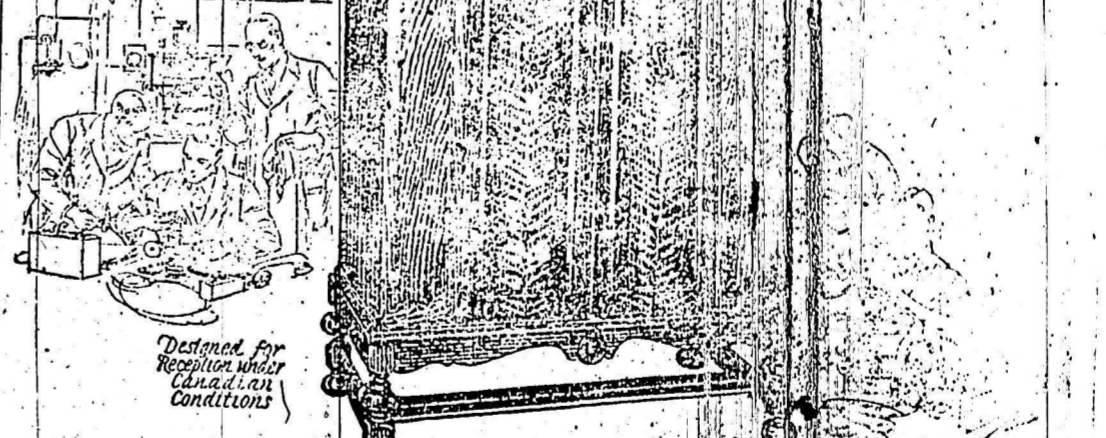
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
