Keeping Warm in Cold Weather

Winter is nearly here, and the best way to keep him is to insulate against it, in spite of the house with warm windows and storm doors, some bright weather-looking to storm windows. In spite of your coat with stockings that are made of real woolen yarn. Felt insulators made from an old felt hat are fine, and crocheted or knitted boots are better than any bedroom slippers that can be devised. Fasten the tops of ordinary slippers sold for the purpose. Bed socks made without heels—just pointed off—and quite long in the legs are excellent for people who suffer from cold feet. Also an old woolen blanket placed over the mattress and under the sheet is a great help towards keeping warm at nights. If storm windows are loose, take strips of felt all around where they touch the sash; and if putty has come off anywhere rub the bare wood with linseed oil, then fill in with fresh putty well worked with the fingers. Left-over putty may be kept in a tight can filled with water.
