To Raze St. Lazare Prison

In the three-cornered struggle between French antiquarians, the Ministry of Justice, and humanitarians and hygienists the last have won, and the Ministry having failed to suggest improvements to their satisfaction has reluctantly consented to the demolition of the notorious prison of St. Lazare at the junction of the Rue de Valenciennes and the Boulevard de Valenciennes, Paris. The old prison, some buildings of which date back to the twelfth century, was first used as a leper hospital, then as an abbey, and then as a seminary—all before the French Revolution. During the Revolution it was used to house debtors and political prisoners—some quite famous. It became a women's prison in 1863, and at one time no fever had been known to women crowded in its tiny cells and stuffy dormitories. Within recent years it housed, while awaiting trial, the beautiful Mme. Schœlcher, alleged to have been perpetrator of the "studolo crime"; Mme. Caillaux, wife of the former Premier, who slew Gaston Calmette in the office of Le Figaro; and the Anarchist girl, Germaine Berton, who shot down Marie Perleau in the office of Leon Daudet. The principal defenders of the old prison have been the antiquarians; its principal enemies, the hygienists. Some months ago the latter succeeded in having the Ministry remove all the prisoners to other places of detention. Now M. Paul Fleuret, President of the Council General of the Seine Department, has submitted a proposal that the site of St. Lazare should be used for a new boys' school. This the Government has accepted, transferring the historic edifice to the Ministry of Education, which will immediately begin its demolition.

Washington.—Falling to wear shoes has been against the law in Portugal since October 1. Because of the many adults who have been in the habit of going barefoot, in the cities as well as in the country districts, the authorities, according to dispatches, see difficulties in enforcing the new statute. To the great number of people in the world who still go unshod, says a bulletin from the headquarters of the National Geographic Society, "and to the varied kinds of footwear in use from the polar regions to the tropics. The tropical countries are the strongholds of the great unshod. In Africa, parts of Central America and the northern portion of South America and in southern Asia, the majority of the human feet are devoid of covering through the seasons and from the cradle to the grave.
