A report from Windsor states that the seizure of 4000 gals of denatured alcohol (pilsner) at the liquor docks at La Salle, possibly points to the source of the death of 40 and illness of scores in New York as the result of drinking bird liquor. Report says a Windsor man is the agent of a New York bootlegging firm. Investigation is being made.

An Orangeville man named Fred. Armbrage was warranted by Provincial Constable L. A. Demina on Friday last and brought to Owen Sound on a charge of false pretences in payment of wages without having any necessary funds in the bank to meet them. It is alleged that Armbrage had been conducting a logging camp near Badjeros, and that he brought from Toronto a number of laborers to work for him, and a list of the week's issued cheques but had when these were presented at the bank there were no funds with which to meet them. It is said there wasn't sufficient food in the camp and some of the men, a number of whom are said to be Russians, did not get anything to eat for several days. When Armbrage came before Magistrate Cross in police court he was committed for a week.

President Doumergue of France is trying to work out a combination by which the Radicals will be obliged to participate in the Government. He will then call on Poincare, getting Poincare's acceptance a doubtful.

On Nov. 6, Jose de Leon Toral, slayer of President-elect Obregon of Mexico, was sentenced to death by firing-squad; and Mother Concepcion, as "intellectual author" of the crime, to 20 years imprisonment. The defending attorney, Soli, announced that he would appeal the case to the Supreme Court of Mexico.

A British syndicate headed by Lord Melchett (Sir Alfred Mond) has obtained concessions for the salt in the Dead Sea region. As an example of the progress of modern Palestine chiefly by initiative of the Jews, who are flocking back, it may be noted that there are now 265 flour mills in the Holy Land, a small country.

On Nov. 6 the last session of the present British Parliament opened in state at the House of Parliament, to which the King and Queen were driven in the historic gilded State coach, escorted by Beefeaters from The Tower. The speech from the Throne foreshadowed the question of protection and free trade, and touched upon the unemployment problem, but did not mention the
