Mrs. James Kirkpatrick A gloom of sadness passed over this community on Thursday afternoon of last week when the news spread around that Mrs. Kirkpatrick had passed away and this community has lost a true and faithful friend and neighbor. She was the daughter of the late Patrick Burns, who emigrated from the north of Ireland nearly 160 years ago and took up land on the Township of St. Vincent and Sydenham about the year 1838, later moving to the Irish Block in Sylpham township. Her father passed away in the year 1858 when Mrs. Kirkpatrick was a girl about 2 years old. Her maiden name was Jessie Burns. She was married to her now deceased husband, Mr. James Kirkpatrick, in the year 1862. They lived for about 12 years in St. Vincent township, north of Goring, and about 24 years ago they moved to the present home near New England church, where the family have been respected members of the church and community. She was stricken a few weeks ago with inward goitre, and although everything possible was done for her by the attending doctor and nurse, she passed peacefully away on Thursday last.

Those left to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother are her husband, one daughter Orlie, and two sons, Roy and James. She is also survived by two sisters, namely: Mrs. Shuler of Meaford and Mrs. Hutchinson of Owen Sound, and three brothers, John of Bayview and William, and James in the United States. The floral tributes were beautiful and spoke silent testimony of the respect in which the deceased was held in this section, and are as follows: Wreaths from The Family, the Community and Women's Institutes; sprays from Mr. R. H. Wiley's family, the Bible Class; Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Fawcett; Edith and Vera, Mr. and Mrs. John Burns and family; and Archie Kirkpatrick. The funeral was held on Sunday, November 25th, at New England cemetery. Services were conducted at the house by Rev. Mr. Stotesbury, who preached a comforting sermon, after which the remains were followed to the cemetery by a large number of sympathizing friends and relatives. The pallbearers were: Messrs. R. D.
