**Mrs. James Kirkpatrick**  
A gloom of sadness passed over this community on Thursday afternoon of last week when the news spread around that Mrs. Kirkpatrick had passed away and this community has lost a true and faithful friend and neighbor. She was the daughter of the late Patrick Burns, who emigrated from the north of Ireland nearly 100 years ago and took up land on the Township of St. Vincent and Sydneyham about the year 1838, later moving to the Irish Block in Sydneyham township. Her father passed away in the year 1858, when Mrs. Kirkpatrick was a girl about 2 years old. Her maiden name was Jessie Burns. She was married to her now bereaved husband, Mr. James Kirkpatrick, in the year 1892. They lived for about 12 years in St. Vincent township, north of Goring, and about 24 years ago they moved to the present home near New England church, where the family have been respected members of the church and community. She was stricken a few weeks ago with inward grief, and although every thing possible was done for her by the attending doctor and nurse, she passed peacefully away on Thursday last.

Those left to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother are her husband, one daughter, Orrie, and two sons, Roy and James. She is also survived by two sisters, namely: Mrs. Sinder of Meaford and Mrs. Hutchinson of Owen Sound, and three brothers, John of Bayview and William and James in the United States. The floral tributes were beautiful and bore eloquent testimony of the respect in which the deceased was held in this section, and are as follows: Wreaths from the family; the "Ombudsman and Women's Institute" sprays from Mr. R. The death of a well known and highly respected citizen of the township of Euphrasia in the person of Joseph Wallace Patton occurred at his residence in Rocklyn on Monday, November 19, 1928, following an extended illness. The deceased was in his seventy-second year, and although his death was not unexpected it will come as a great shock to his many friends.

The late Mr. Patton was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Patton, and was born on the ninth line, Euphrasia. Over forty years ago he was married to Miss Sarah Hughes, who survives him. The deceased was a life-long resident of the community in which he was born and has acted as councillor for a number of years. He was also secretary of Blantyre school for over thirty years, treasurer of the Rocklyn Agricultural Society and a strong member of the Orange Order. Of a quiet but cheerful nature, he was highly thought of by all with whom he was acquainted.

Besides the bereaved widow, there survived three daughters, Mrs. S. Clarke, McIntyre; Mrs. S. Magee and Mrs. C. Henderson, Toronto, and two sons, William of Saskatchewan, and Wesley on the homestead on the ninth line, Euphrasia. He also leaves three sisters, Mrs. Coult of Toronto, Mrs. Foster Clarke of Goring and Mrs. R. J.
