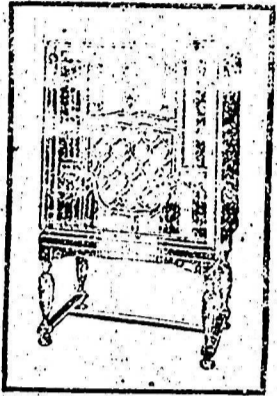

She is survived by her husband, and an adopted daughter, Dorothy; two brothers, Fred Boardman of Ottawa, and George Boardman of Los Angeles, Calif.; and one sister, Miss Helen Boardman of Vancouver, who is at present on a visit in Markdale. The funeral will take place from her late residence to-day (Thursday) at 2:30 o'clock to the Markdale Cemetery.

### Nothing in Rumor Regarding Use of Cars for Marketing Produce

An unwarranted rumor has been in circulation in various parts of the Province for some time that actions had been or were about to be taken against farmers for hauling produce from their homes to market or mill in passenger cars. Mr. Geo. Spotton, M.P., took the matter up with the Provincial authorities who informed him that there is not the slightest ground for that impression. A farmer has the right to use his passenger car for any purpose connected with his business, and can freely take grain to the mill, cream to the creamery, produce to market, or fill it with livestock. The only stipulation is that this must be done for himself and not for hire or pay by another party; or change the shape of his car so as to make it a truck.

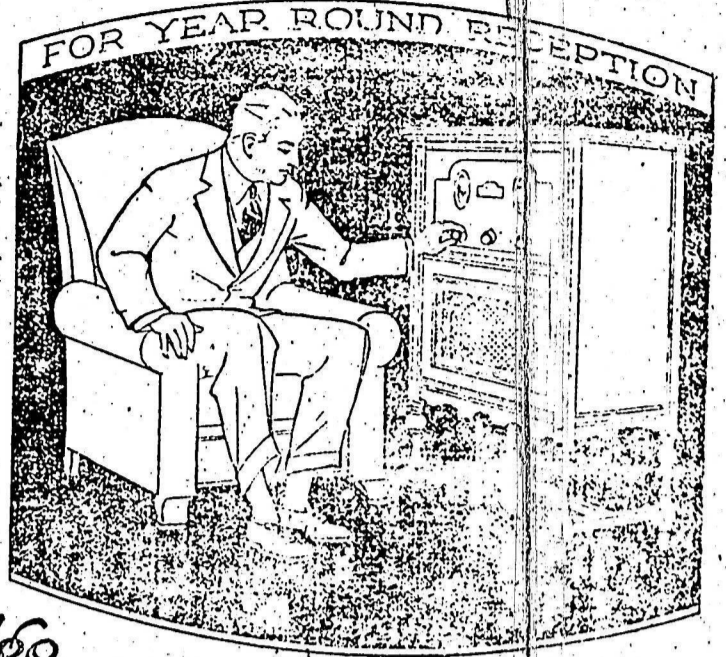
