## Death of Mrs. Ireland

A number of people in this vicinity will regret to hear of the death of Mrs. Jeanne Ireland, wife of Mr. Alexander Ireland, who passed away at her home in Hespeler, in her 72nd year, the funeral taking place on December 8th. The Irelands were formerly Sullivan township people, and for some time lived at Williamsford, where Mr. Ireland conducted a tailor shop.

## Mr. Fred. P. Champion

A great shock came to Mr. Robert Hopkins of this village on December 4th, in the news of the sudden death from heart failure of his brother, Mr. Fred. P. Champion of St. Catharines, who was formerly well and favorably known in this vicinity. Mr. Champion was born in Arkona, Ont., in 1870, the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Champion. He was married 25 years ago to Miss Hettie Crow of Peterborough. He goes to mourn his sudden departure his wife; two daughters, Elizabeth and Edith; and one son, Alexander. There are also three brothers—A. H. Champion, George T., and Louis—all of Toronto; and four sisters—Mrs. G. W. Robinson of Winona, Mrs. (Rev.) Judson MacIntosh of Oakland, California; Mrs. Neil MacKinnon of Toronto, and Mrs. Bobt. Hopkins of Chatsworth. When in this vicinity Mr. Champion lived with his parents; what was known as the "Wright farm" in Chatsworth, about three and a half miles east of Chatsworth. He was a widower. The many beautiful flowers sent at the time of his death speak for the respect in which he was held in St. Catharines, in which he had been a resident for only two years. The Rev. G. McLean, of Toronto, formerly of St. Catharines, officiated at the ceremony.
