PER YEAR IN ADVANCE

William A. Bushfield

The Stratford Beacon-Herald of Wednesday, January 2nd, reports the death of a former resident of this place, in the person of Mr. William A. Bushfield, a son of Mr. A. Bushfield, some years ago the manager of the furniture factory here.

"There died very suddenly in Detroit on Monday a former well known resident of this city in the person of William A. Bushfield, at the age of 55 years. The late Mr. Bushfield was born in Stratford. He was a veteran of the great war, spending thirty months in France with the engineers and being on duty when the armistice was signed. Before leaving for Chicago two years ago the deceased young man conducted a jewelry business on Downie street. He had been in Detroit for more than a year. Surviving are his wife and two children; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Bushfield, 237 St. Albans St.; two brothers, Bruce, Colborne St. and Leslie, Adelaide St.; also two sisters, Mrs. Fraser Campbell, Owen Sound, and Miss Minnie Bushfield, nurse-in-training in Hamilton. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the home of his parents. Interment will be made in Avondale cemetery."
