 After an extended illness Mr. Jno. Manarey, a life long resident and highly respected citizen of this community, passed away at his home here on Thursday, January 10, and by his death this locality has lost one of its early pioneers.  
 Deceased was born in Ireland 76 years ago and came with his parents to this country when he was 17 years of age, settling on the farm where his death occurred.  
 He was married fifty-two years ago to Miss Sarah Ann Knott, who predeceased him two years ago.  
 Deceased was a staunch Conservative and a member of the Rocklyn Orange Lodge. The community too feel that they have lost a kind friend and neighbor, who was ever ready to help, and brought sunshine into many homes. The late Mr. Manarey was a man of very fine character, belonging to a type that is best known by an ever deepening acquaintance and his passing has left a vacancy that will be difficult to fill.
