

There is no reason to suppose that they will be so readily expected to be influenced by considerations which affect the League.

There is, however, another question to be answered, another question having to do with the special problems presented by individual industries. Take the problem of unemployment in the mines, for example. The fact that they are still languishing, unable as yet to achieve rationalization, by their own efforts, will also react unfavorably on the prospects of the party in power, unless there is speedy improvement. YORK—Having completed the first phase of the Wilkins-Hearst expedition's work in the Antarctic, Capt. Sir Hubert Wilkins, president of the American Geographical Society, which sponsored the expedition.

On the sixty-fifth parallel south, or within 100 miles of the Antarctic circle, Wilkins found the spot of North Graham Island cut by indentations so deep that they almost met, threatening to sever it into still another island. These indentations he named the Hecla Islands.

A group of six islands discovered southeast of South Graham Island by the expedition, in honor of Mr. John H. Hearst, president of the American Geographical Society, which sponsored the expedition.

EDGE OF CONTINENT "Capt. Wilkins established what he believes to be the true edge of the Antarctic continent on approximately the 77th parallel south. This he named Hecla Land in honor of William Randolph Hearst, by whom the expedition was largely financed.

One portion of the South Graham Island coast Capt. Wilkins designated as Boyman coast in honor of Roy Boyman, director of the American Geographical Society. Various mountains, plateaus, glaciers and other geographical features were named for different persons whom Wilkins desired to honor.

Britain to Test Largest Dirigible For Flight to U.S.

R-100, Designed for Trans-Atlantic Service, Finishing Touches at Yorkshire Yards to Go on Her Trial Trips

LONDON.—The R-100, largest airship in the world, which is being constructed at Howden, Yorkshire, will undergo its first tests within a few weeks, according to "The Sunday Times."

Only the finishing touches to the structure remain to be made, it is expected that the gas bags will be ready for inflation toward the end of the month. It is intended that the R-100 fly across the Atlantic with 100 passengers after the tests have been completed.

The craft has been under construction for the last two years and is a sister ship of the R-101, which is now being built for the Air Ministry. It is probable that tests will be made from the air station in Cardigan, Yorkshire, in early spring and the demonstration voyage to the United States and return will follow in the early summer, when weather conditions probably will be best for the flight.

Commander C. Dennis Burney, member of Parliament and who will command the dirigible and under whose supervision the craft is being built by the Airship Construction Company, said that the progress is satisfactory, and that, unless some unexpected trouble arises, the R-100 will take to the air very soon.

The craft represents a new epoch in airship building, for not only is she the first dirigible of her kind designed for world operation but the work has been undertaken with a view toward commercial success.

If the experiment proves successful and financial support is forthcoming, even larger airships will be forthcoming. It is understood that the Airship Guarantee Company already has plans for a colossal craft with a capacity for more than 9,000,000 cubic feet of gas.
