Killed by Falling Tree

Mr. Thomas Carefoot, 3rd line St. Vincent, died early this Thursday morning at his home from injuries received by being struck by part of a falling tree Wednesday afternoon.

With his son, Harold, Mr. Carefoot was working in the wood lot on his farm felling a tree. The tree split and part of it fell striking Mr. Carefoot. His son called help, the Messrs. McVittie being at work in their bush nearby. The injured man was rushed to his home and medical aid called from Meaford. From the first it was seen that his injuries would be fatal as he was badly crushed about the lower part of the body and one leg was badly fractured.

The accident has cast a gloom over the community in which Mr. Carefoot was so well known and highly respected. He was a man below middle age and leaves a wife and a young family of eight to whom is extended the sympathy of the district.

He is also survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Carefoot, and several brothers. Mr. Carefoot some years ago purchased the Wm. Ferguson farm and it was in the bush lot on this farm that the accident happened.—Meaford Mirror.
