Markford High School board has asked the Council to provide \$10500 for 1929 and the Public School board has asked for \$18800, a total of \$27100 for school purposes.

#### GENELEC COUNCIL

Council met February 9, all members present. R. C. Fe is the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted as read. Communications from Dr. Carehart, re: Indignities (held over); T. S. Comber, statement of Receipts and Expenditures of School Fair by-law 710, providing for expenditure on Roads and Bridges for 1929, was passed; Ontario Townships Roads Association, re: membership and convention; Minister of Highways, re: Good Roads Association Annual Convention; R. C. Muir, Dept. of Highways, acknowledging receipt in detail from Road Superintendent Mr. T. Turnbull showing work and expenditure on roads in 1928.

By-law No. 711, appointing Patrolmen, Saepe Inspectors and Weed Inspectors for 1929, was passed. The Weed Inspectors are as follows: Ward 1, Thos. V. Bell; Ward 2, Jno. Stoddart; Ward 3, Frank Meigher; Ward 4, Hugh Vaughan Jr. The Road Superintendent presented Vol. No. 2 for Road Improvement, showing total expenditure of \$122.25, which was passed. The following accounts were passed: Mal. Black, on collection of taxes, \$10.00; J. McEachnie, 1 1/2 days inspecting roads, \$4.50; J. Boyd, telephoning, 40c; M. Kenny, refund of dog tax, having shot dog, \$4.00; Municipal World, Assessor's supplies, Statute Amendments and supplies, \$38.34; Markdale Standard, account dated Jan. 28, 1928, for Auditor's Report and advertising in 1928, \$35.75; Clerk for registering 17 births, 1 marriage and 17 deaths in 1928 \$8.75.

The Auditor presented their report to the Council, showing total receipts of year ending December 31, 1928, to be \$46182.26; total payments \$44,641.28, leaving balance on hand of \$1540.98.

McEachnie - Boyd—That the Auditor's Report be adopted and that the auditors, Messrs. Beaton and Robinson, be paid \$15.00 each for their services. 50 copies of report be printed, and that A. Jackson be paid \$1.25 re search of Treasurer's Securities and J. McGirr be paid \$1.00 re search of securities.—Carried.

Boyd - McEachnie—That Treasurer accept the sum of \$6.31, balance due from Holland re townline work, 1928.—Carried.

McEachnie - Wright—That we pay Artemesia township sum of \$5.82, balance due re work on Townline in 1928.—Carried.

Wright - McEachnie—That the salary of the Treasurer be \$225 per year and that by-law providing for his appointment be amended accordingly.—Carried.

Wright - Boyd—That this Council offer a reward of \$100.00 to the person, or persons, who kills the first wolf, or \$50.00 for the second wolf, when proof is furnished that said animals were killed within the Township of Genelec.—Carried.

McEachnie - McGirr—That Mr. W. J. Hewit be donated \$50.00 for keep of Mrs. Scott, deceased.—Carried. Council adjourned to March 2nd, 1929.


Holland, Feb. 5, 1929
