The Late Elmer Tuck

The funeral of the late Elmer Tuck, who passed away in Owen Sound hospital on Tuesday, February 19th, took place at Markdale Cemetery on Saturday afternoon. Service was conducted at the home of his brother, Mr. Thomas Tuck, Rev. Wm. Coutts, parson of Cooke's Church, to which the deceased belonged, had charge of the service and was assisted by Rev. A. Newton St. John. After the church service the buriel service of the Odd Fellows Lodge was read; Bob W. J. Howard acting as Noble Grand and Bro. M. V. Buffam as Chaplain. The members of Sauganee Lodge marched to the cemetery ahead of the funeral procession and members of the Lodge, all close friends of the deceased, Messrs. Harold Bowler, A. O. They resided in town and made a

host of friends.

The deceased was always interested

in community activities and for

the past four years served in the

Village Council.

He was chairman of the

Waterworks Department during

his years of service in the Council

and under his supervision much work

was accomplished to better conditions.

One feature in connection

with this was the cleaning of the

stream where the intake is located.

Since this work was done Markdale

had has absolutely pure water.

For this alone Elmer Tuck deserves to be remembered as one of those who rendered service worth while to the

Village of Markdale.

For the past seven years the writer

has been closely associated with

the deceased, more particularly dur-

ing the three years in which we were

in the Village Council together.

We always found him fair, honorable and

ready to make any sacrifice in the

interests of the municipality.

Elmer Tuck was one of the native sons of

Markdale and he did what he could

and he did it well in advancing the

place of his birth. He has passed to

his reward, but his work will live

after him.
