Mr. and Mrs. George Brown and family will be moving shortly to reside at Riverdale. We hope Mr. Brown may have better health and wish them every success in their new home.

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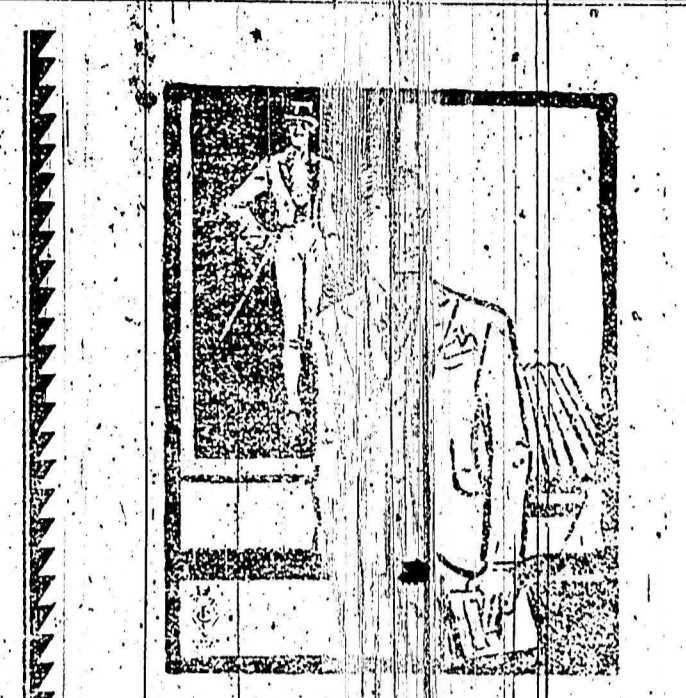
