Charles Ramage, editor of the Durham Review, last week celebrated his 30th birthday.

Harry A. Hunter, a well-known resident of Durham, died in Toronto on March 1st, aged 54 years.

Lavi Allen of Melancthon township was fined \$200 and costs or six months in jail for operating a still.

John Piester of Proton will open a supplement agency in Flesherton, representing the International Harvester Co.

Thomas Whitmore, chief of the Durham fire brigade has resigned and Arthur McDonald has been appointed in his place.

Mrs. David Armstrong of St. Vincent had one of her ankles badly broken when she was kicked and trampled by a cow which she was milking.

T. S. Parkinson of Orangeville was elected Grand Superintendent of Wellington District, Royal Arch Masons, at the Grand Chapter meeting held at Kingston recently.

Amos Clarke of Proton has in his possession all but one of the assessment schedules and collectors' receipts of Proton township since the year 1857. These were kept by Mr. Clarke's father up to the time of his death and since that time by Mr. Clarke.

Wrong Reeve Takes Seat

(Municipal World)
There is a case to be made on a misreading of the Municipal Act of the fall of 1928. The paper from which this is taken is as follows:

At a meeting of the W. Findlay, of Flesherton, was elected Reeve of the village at the municipal election held on January 7, circumstances were such that he had no control over the election. He was elected at the January session of the County council and he was compelled to see his predecessor and election opponent, W. H. Thurston, hold the position during the entire session.

Under the clause of the Municipal Act governing such cases, only Mr. Findlay and one councillor were elected on the statutory date, and as this was not one-half of the council, the reeve-elect could not take office until the balance of the council was elected.

The election was held on Thursday and the vacancies filled, but before Mr. Findlay could sit on the county council he would have to call a meeting of the village council and organize, and as there was not sufficient time for this, he did not take his seat on the county council, but Mr. Thurston, who was reeve last year and was entitled to hold office until a successor was elected, exercised his right and attended the session.

There is nothing in the Municipal Act, authorizing the clerk to issue a certificate to reeve of council of 1928 entitling him to take his seat as reeve at the county council of the present year unless he was re-elected as reeve. The reeve-elect for 1929, if he had filed the declaration of qualifications and office with the clerk, was entitled to certificate authorizing him to sit in the county council. See section 201 and Form 15, Municipal Act.

Do not incur the penalties which the law imposes for failure to file.

What is Required of Persons Acting as Trustees

All trustees, executors, administrators, assignees, receivers or persons acting in a fiduciary capacity are required to make a detailed return of the income of the estate or trust which they represent.

This return should be made on Form T3.

What is Required of Employers

Each employer in Canada must make a return giving particulars of salaries, wages, commissions, fees, bonuses and other remuneration of all direc-

Locations of Income Tax Offices

Inspectors of Dominion Income Tax are located in convenient places throughout Canada. They will comply promptly with written requests for information. tors, officers, agents, employees, professional persons or other persons who receive income for more during the calendar year 1928, and who were paid any salary, wage or salary (including bonuses) equal to \$1,500 or more during the same period.

Employers should ask for Form T4.

What is Required of Corporations

Every corporation in Canada is required to file a return of its dividends or share bonuses paid or credited during the calendar year 1928.

This return should be made on Form T5.

Get Your Forms at Once!

Blank forms may be obtained by writing your nearest Inspector of Dominion Income Tax, or Postmaster, or the Income Tax Division, Ottawa. The addresses of inspectors are given herewith. Full instructions appear on each form.

Do not delay because of the absence of officials who generally sign such returns. Any responsible member of a firm or corporation, or any person acting as agent for the trustee, may sign these returns and so avoid the penalty. March 31 is the last day for making information reports required under the Income War Tax Act.

The Income Tax Division respectfully asks for the full cooperation of taxpayers required by law to make these returns.
