

Mr. Charles Eagles

A wave of sadness overcame the community when it became known that Mr. Charles Eagles, a highly esteemed citizen of Cherry Grove, 11th Line, Euphrasia, had passed away early on Tuesday morning after a trying illness of short duration. His wife was at his bedside when the end came peacefully.

About two months previous he had contracted the flu which gradually undermined his strength and in his weakened condition he was unable to resist the fatal attack which seized him previous to his death. During his illness he received the unrelenting care and attention of his faithful and devoted wife, his brothers and sisters were also in constant attendance when needed.

Charles Eagles was born near Woodstock, St. Vincent, sixty-five years ago and has resided in this and adjoining vicinities all his life. He was the second eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Eagles, who were respected pioneer residents of these parts for many years. He was united in marriage with Miss Sarah Hill of Cherry Grove on September 30th, 1891, who survives. Four brothers, Samuel of Toronto, Frederick of St. Vincent, John of Orange Valley and Alfred of Holland, and two sisters, Miss Lavina Blakely, 11th Line, Euphrasia, and Mrs. Robert Blakely of Toronto, also survived.

Mr. Eagles was a man of fine character which commanded the respect of all who knew him. He had a host of friends who sincerely regret his loss.

The funeral was held Friday afternoon from his late residence. A most impressive and comforting service was conducted by the Rev. A. N. St. John, who spoke in the highest terms of the departed. The Rev. A. Mills also officiated. Interment took place in Markdale Public Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. Samuel, Fred John and Alfred Eagles, Thomas, Robert, Oliver and Nat Hill.

Deceased was born in Vaughan Township but came here about the age of 10 years, with his parents, and has resided on the 3rd Con. ever since. He grew to manhood amid the trials and successes of the early settlers and married Miss Mary McGinnis, who predeceased him by 14 years.
