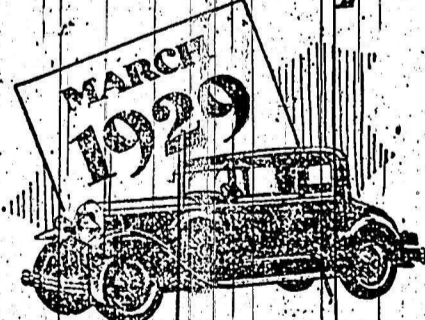

Chinaman Takes Own Life

Sold Hing, a brother of George Hing, the proprietor of the local cafe, committed suicide by drowning Sunday afternoon in a pond on the farm of Mr. Frank Maudsley, nearly opposite the cemetery. The unfortunate man, who had been feeling strange since about two or three weeks ago, had been closely watched by his brother during the day but finally eluded him and made his way to the big sheet of water covered lying on his back at about two feet of water. Although only in the water a few minutes life was extinct when he was pulled out. Dr. Bibby of Flesherton, coroner for Grey county, was called and after viewing the remains and gathering the facts in connection with the matter, decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The body was reburied in the mortuary chapel at the cemetery and the funeral was held Tuesday afternoon. Rev. A. Newton St. John conducted the burial services. Another brother who resides at Port Colborne was also here for the funeral.

Mrs. G. Boyce Passes Away

(Flesherton Advance) An old pioneer of Artemesia passed away on Thursday of last week at the home of her sons, Chas. and John Boyce, Stone's Lane, at the age of 72 years. She was born in Artemesia and lived here all her life. She was a member of the Continuing Presbyterian Church at Preeceville, and the pastor, Rev. G. W. Fisher, conducted the services at the home, and Rev. Purcell of Flesherton at the grave. The funeral took place on Saturday at the Preeceville Presbyterian cemetery. The pallbearers were George Fisher, Archie Fisher, R. R. Parry, E. D. Whittaker, Thomas Hazard, and Bert Irwin. The deceased lady, whose maiden name was Sarah Jane Wright, was married about 57 years ago to the late George H. Boyce, and leaves a family of five: John, Charles, Will and Rena at home, and Mrs. S. Shier of Preeceville.

Lorraine Irwin

On Wednesday morning, March 13 there passed from earth one of the brightest gems to adorn the Diadem of Heaven, in the person of Lorraine Irwin, only child of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Irwin, pastor of the United Church on the Carnegie Mission. When about four years old Lorraine contracted scarlet fever and had never been real strong since. Some two weeks before her death she developed spinal meningitis and after much suffering, which was plentily borne, God took her to himself. Lorraine was a bright and active little girl of eight years and ten months, beloved by all who knew her.

The funeral took place on Friday afternoon. The service was in charge of Professor Wright of Toronto University, brother of A. D. Irwin, assisted by Rev. B. A. McEae, B.A., of Minden, Rev. C. C. Miller of Haliburton and Capt. Wright of the Salvation Army, Hamilton. Singing the service the school sang "O Windows," one of the deceased's favorite hymns. The whole service was impressive. 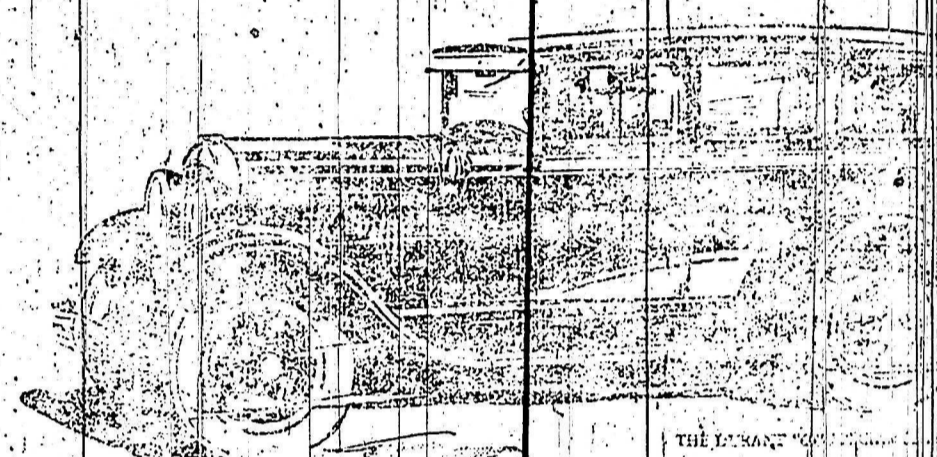
