



**Low Salaries**

La Patrie (Cons.): Why do our rulers exert themselves in vain to settle this country by a vigorous immigration policy? Why do our compatriots continue to cross the frontier into the United States? We can find the answer in the table of our imports. Immigrants will not stay here, and workers leave the country because there is no work for them in Canada. It is foreign factories which feed the market of local consumption, so that employment for our workers is outside our own borders. . . . At their last meeting the Trades and Labor Council of Montreal called attention to the level of salaries, which is below that of the cost of living. Why are salaries so low? Simply because, as a result of the persistent development of our import trade, there is less and less demand for workers in Canada. This is likely to last until the working class realizes its peril and revolts against a policy which deprives it of its daily bread.
