Carruthers - Gilchrist - That the Reeve be empowered to sign and execute the application for the public and property damage policy of the Western Assurance Co., relieving the Township of one hundred per cent. of its liability to the public on its highways and bridges for the term of one year up to the 31st of Dec. 1930 in case of injury or death to one person, the result of one accident; \$100.00 in case of injury or death to more than one person the result of one accident; \$100.00 covering any damage caused to property of the public, the result of one accident, any action brought against the Township, all expenses connected with litigation, all legal fees, Court costs, etc., are shouldered by the company. -Carried.
