Cameron Smith, was invited to address a special meeting of the local W. I. It was decided that it would be more advantageous to hold the regular June meeting on the above date at the home of Mrs. Ben Bradley. This meeting was an exceptionally interesting and enjoyable event. The President, Mrs. E. Bradley, presided. The meeting opened with the Ode, followed by the Lord's Prayer in unison. Mrs. A. Bowen then presented the minutes of the previous meeting. Arrangements were made for conveying the delegate and other appointed members to the District Annual Meeting to be held at Walters Falls. It was announced that there is an invitation from the Ravensara branch to attend the 25th anniversary of the organization of their branch. The celebration is to take the form of a picnic with an admission fee of 25c each, the C. G. W. I. to contribute at least one number to the program. The business session was made as brief as possible as the large number present were anxious to hear the speaker of the afternoon. The roll call was answered by an exchange of seeds, plants and bulbs. A pleasant feature of the afternoon's proceedings was an address and presentation each to Mrs. Arthur Bowen and the President, Mrs. E. Bradley. Mrs. Ben Bradley read the address and Mrs. E. Bradley presented the former with a coffee percolator, while Mrs. A. Bowen read the address and Mrs. W. J. Ward presented the latter with a club bag. Both ladies replied in suitable terms. Mrs. Bradley's address is given below. Mrs. Bowen's address is not to hand but we hope to have it for next week. The National Anthem was then sung after which the guests had the pleasure of listening to Miss Smith, who was previously introduced by the president. "It might be added that Miss Smith taught school for a number of years, is a graduate nurse, has travelled much, having spent some time in Japan, and was overseas during the World War where she rendered valuable services as nurse. The subjects which formed the basis of the speaker's address were as follows: "How to meet medical and surgical emergencies"; "Public Health and Social Hygiene"; "Domestic Remedies"; "Diet in Disease"; "The three P's—Flies, Food and Fingers"; "Where Chapters of Canadian History were written"; "What it means to be a Canadian"; "Canada's Literature and Art"; "Ontario's Hinterland and its new Canadians". The speaker enumerated a number of contagious diseases which were traceable to lack of good water and proper sanitation and therefore were

preventable. These subjects were thrown open for discussion which was readily taken advantage of and much valuable information was gleaned as to First Aid Methods under various circumstances. The speaker urged upon her audience to make continual war on the house fly, it being a carrier of disease. Miss Smith said she was proud of being a Canadian and proved herself conversant with many Canadian authors, emphasizing the fact that Canadians should read more Canadian literature and less American. The address was the outstanding feature of the meeting. At the conclusion of her splendid address the speaker was accorded a vote of thanks and a hearty clap of the hands. The ladies then served refreshments during which a happy social hour was spent.

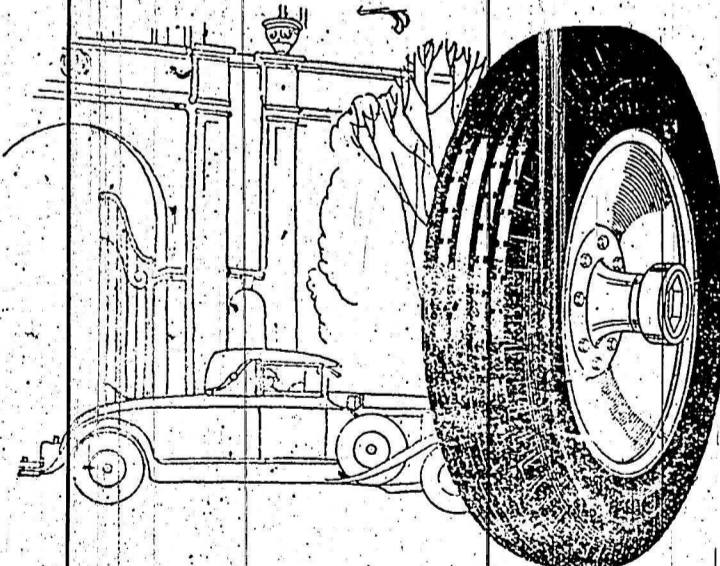
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
