The Royal York, largest hotel and finest building in the British Empire, will be open shortly in Toronto. It is a self-contained community having its own bank, brokers' offices, stores, power station, printing plant, recreation centres, and so on.

Gas from wells of the Bow River and South Saskatchewan Valley to the south and west of Medicine Hat may provide helium gas for the British Air Ministry.

The Boy Scouts' Knowledge in woodcraft may be turned to a new use in Nova Scotia where the provincial government forestry department propose to clear their services in the planting of 1,500,000 trees to reforest 1,000 acres of land.

The Canadian Pacific has in excess of 91,000 employees and its yearly pay-roll is approximately \$125,000,000.

The announcement by the Atlantic steamship lines of reduced rates on cabin ships coincides with the opening of an Atlantic travel season in which the cabin type of ship reaches a standard of equipment and accommodation never hitherto reached and during which more cabin ships than ever will sail to and from Europe. The advent of reduced rates also harmonizes with the policy of many world governments to abolish passport visas. Ocean tourist travel is quickly getting back to pre-war conditions but greatly enhanced by bigger and better ships, says William Baird, Steamship Passenger Traffic Manager, Canadian Pacific Steamships Limited.

Orders for Canadian cheese shipped from Great Britain, demonstrate its popularity overseas and the confidence placed in our grading methods, according to Doctor J. A. Rudwick, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, who states that the British demand for Canadian cheese is at the peak.

Between four and five thousand bags of Garnet wheat are being shipped from Port William to be tested by millers in Great Britain. Reports of the reception given these samples will be available before this year's crop is ripe, government officials expect. If these prove favourable the future of this early ripening variety should be assured.

Deer grading in Canada will be established shortly under regulations framed by the Dominion Government. R. S. Hamer, chief of the cattle division of the Department of Agriculture, announced at the annual meeting of the Ontario Cattle Breeder's Association in Toronto the other day. The proposed system will be a voluntary one and will be confined to municipalities with facilities for inspection and grading at the time of the slaughter. The aim in view is the stabilizing of the market and the breeding of better cattle.

The biggest shipment of live muskrats ever to be shipped from Canada, a thousand in number, were carried by Canadian Pacific Express Company from Oak Lake, Manitoba to Hamburg, Germany recently. They were trapped in the muskrat grounds on the Manitoba rat farm and shipped in boxes, each box holding two pairs. They were shipped via E. F. Froughter, Bremerford from Montreal and the muskrats were in good condition with a minimum of casualties when they reached destination.

The Royal York Hotel, Toronto, is the best hotel in the city, and the best hotel in the world, according to the Canadian General. June 11. The hotel is the reception day for the world's press and the whole water front of Toronto is rapidly remembering that of New York with the building of "business structures" at which this is the outstanding.

On the authority of an official report recently issued it appears that the bicycle is gaining in popularity in Canada. In 1928 production of bicycles in Canada reached a new record with the selling value of products 52 per cent higher than in 1927. Last year 27,399 wheels were sold valued at \$899,487.

Within the next few weeks the largest tree-planting venture so far made by the Ontario Government will be under way in the planting of 125,000 trees in the Thousand Islands region near the Soo. This is to be largely experimental and as a guide to schemes under contemplation for the future in different parts of Ontario.

W. E. Wilford will assume the title of purchasing agent, Canadian Pacific Express Company, according to an announcement recently given out by W. E. Roberts, general purchasing agent of the railway. Mr. Wilford will have most of the work in connection with the Royal York Hotel purchases. He joined the company as a clerk in the purchasing department in 1908.

Fourteen acres of orchards were carried from England to Japan recently under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific Express Company to the order of the Emperor of Japan. The Emperor and members of the Imperial Court. They are seen out from the island about three times a year and are highly valued by the Japanese Royal Family and Court.

A new wheat known as R-49, bred by the United States Department of Agriculture, has been tested and found to be a highly desirable variety. It is a high yielding, early maturing, rather soft wheat, which has been crossed with Marquis wheat and the progeny again crossed with Marquis, resulting in a grain which is three quarters of Marquis and one quarter of R-49. The plant breeders have carried on their experiments at the Manitoba Agricultural College and from as many as 58 strains of wheat R-49 seems so far to be the most promising.

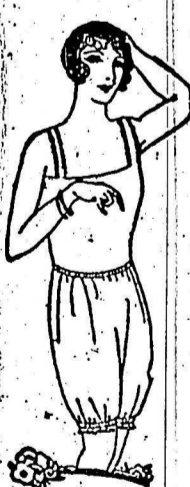
