### Mrs. W. G. Pickell

It is our sad duty this week to report the passing of a former resident of Flesherston and Markdale in the person of Mrs. Elizabeth A. Wright Pickell, who was born in 1843, in LaSalle county, town of LaSalle, the seventh child of the late G. L. Wright and Mrs. Wright of Dublin, Ireland. When seven years old the family moved west to the county of Grey. In this primitive home near to nature's heart the little girl grew up loving the wild flowers, birds and the stately trees of the forest, the crystal springs and sparkling waterfalls. In her compositions of poetry and prose written at different times in her private life and papers many references are made to the dear old forest home. At the age of sixteen she was converted, under the ministry of Rev. Arthur Brown, joined the Methodist church and remained a life-long member. When sixteen years and six months old she left the old Spring Hill school in Arctimessia to teach school. She taught and studied acquiring a first class certificate. Her teaching years were chiefly spent in the neighborhood of Eugenia. That she won the hearts of her pupils is evidenced by letters in later years from many of them in distant parts of Canada and the United States.

In 1869 she was happily married to the late W. G. Pickell, who predeceased her Nov. 2, 1914. Their home was on the old Pickell farm where their family of six sons and two daughters were born. In 1888 she and her husband retired to Markdale, where they built what was to be their home in old age. Then the sudden passing of her husband and the death of her dear son, Charles, who remained at home with them, the breaking up and the selling of the home were sad events crowded into three years time which she bore bravely with Christian submission. Leaving her old home, she spent some time with her son in New York, Compo, where she lived in apartments in Portage La Prairie, Man. After two years residence there she was called to the bedside of her son Austin who later passed away. Returning west she made her home with her daughter in Regina, where she died following a stroke on June 26th.

On arrival of the news from Monday the funeral was held from St. John's United Church, Flesherston, and was conducted by Rev. A. Neoult, St. John's of Markdale, who gave comforting messages to the bereaved. Dr. E. C. Murray of Flesherston sang a solo, "The Home-land." Among those present from a distance were Mr. Alfred A. Wright of New York, brother of the deceased, son W. Guy and Mrs. Pickell and family of three of Paris, son R. Goldwin, wife and two daughters of Brantford, Mrs. J. A. Urquhart of Brantford, Sask., Mrs. (Rev.) F. C. Stevens of Koozistak, Man. and daughters, Mrs. Sweeney of Brantford, Mr. and Mrs. Causland and daughter of Paris, Mr. and Mrs. Brown of Toronto. Her two daughters accompanied the remains East. One more flower of this part of Ontario has passed on to her reward.

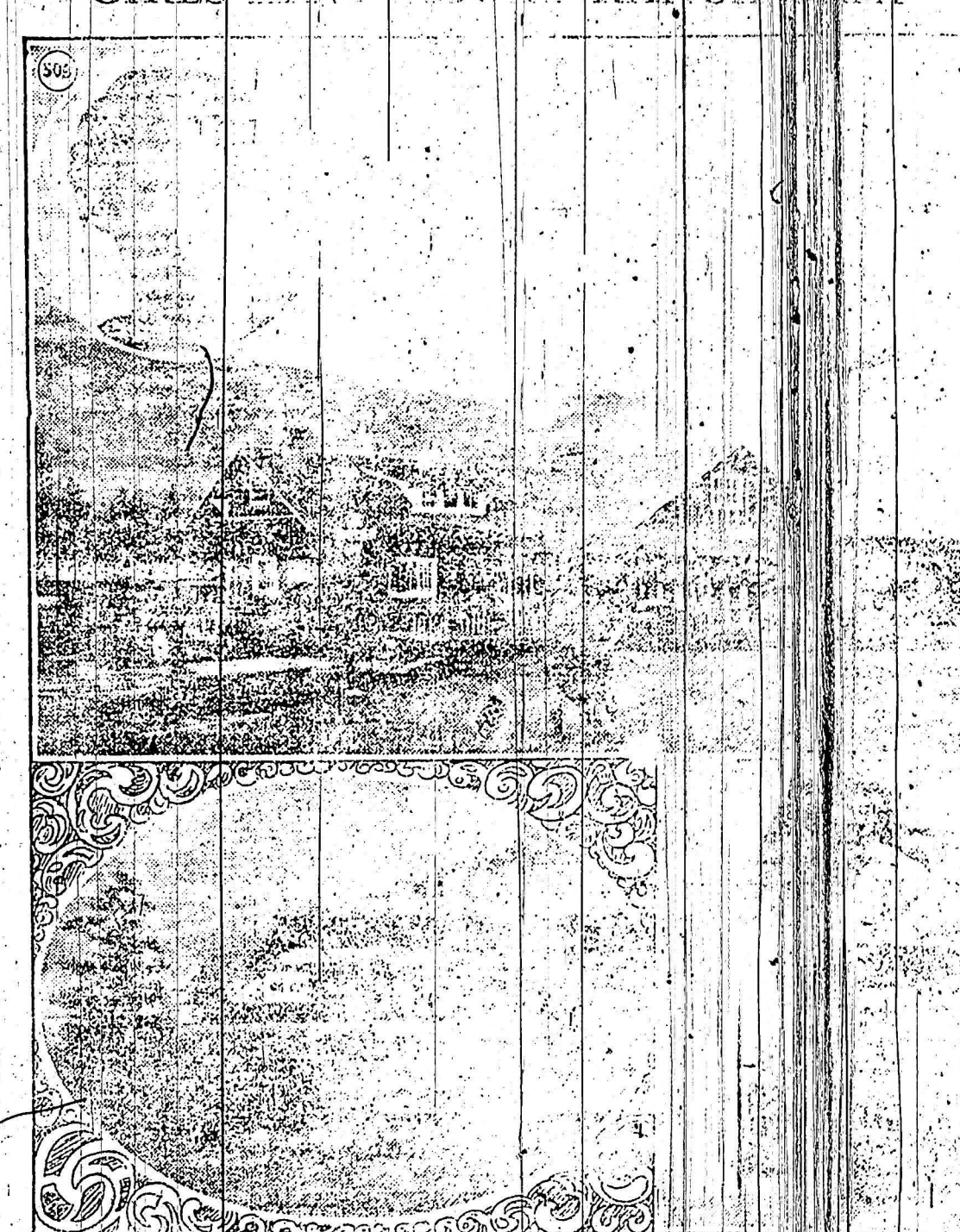
