**The Highway Paving**

If the Dufferin Construction Company keep up the pace they have been working at, another five weeks will see Provincial Highway No. 10 between Shelburne and Orangeville completely paved and open for traffic, which is to say the laying of the concrete would be completed by the end of next week. As the road is not thrown open to traffic until twenty-one days after the cement is laid, the paving from the middle of last week and the field of operations moved to the end of the cement a lot south of Orangeville. By the end of the week the work southwards had reached post 20 sideward more than a foot, and the contractors hoped to reach 25 kilowatt, at the foot of Elba Hill, this week. The Dufferin Construction Co. had 7.5 miles of paving to do. If the company in charge of the paving from below Galedon Mountain to connect up south of Orangeville had been anything like as speedy they had only 6.5 miles to do, a few weeks more would see the highway paved and open to traffic from here to Toronto and all the detours done away with.—Shelburne Free Press and Economist.

**This Bush Does Damage**

That one year's loss from grain rust in the County of Simcoe caused by the common and purple-leaved barberry is sufficient to pay the entire tax bill of the county for ten years was the startling statement made at the first meeting of a campaign to eradicate the destructive pest from the county, recently held in Barrie.

This was only one of several startling statements made to arouse people to the seriousness of the menace. It was stated that if the barberry is allowed to spread during the next ten years at the same rate it has in the past twenty it will be impossible to profitably grow a cereal crop in the county.

The Weed Control Act has been changed this year stipulating that a municipal council shall, on the receipt of a petition bearing ten names take steps to destroy barberry on any property, the cost to be charged against the property. Here tofore action with municipal councils has been optional.

A distinct cleavage as between farm and summer residential property owners was brought to light at the meeting. The large estate and cottage owners are being blamed to a large extent for the spread of the pest for it is along the lake shore that most serious conditions prevail. These people, it was stated, having no crops at stake, show no inclination to remove the menace. In years gone by they have set out bushes and hedges for decorative purposes with the result that to-day the shrubs are growing wild and the spores carried by birds and the wind a distance of fifteen and twenty miles. Three years ago while townships were practically wiped out by rust and the average annual loss from \$200 to \$500, entirely due to the barberry. The road from Barrie to Shanty Bay was said to be lined on both sides by wild barberry and the town of Collingwood was said to be a decided menace to neighboring counties due to widespread prevalence of barberry, the sale of which is now forbidden by nurseries.

The common barberry is a tall growing plant with arching branches and clusters of blooms with saw tooth thorns, while the Japanese barberry is low growing, has not the saw tooth thorns.—Collingwood Bulletin.

**Lost an Eye**

A most distressing accident, and the only one of the day, took place at the celebration here on Monday, as a result of which Mr. Thomas Brownlee was operated upon yesterday morning and had his left eye removed.

Mr. Brownlee, a war veteran, was participating with the local company of the Grey Regiment in a sham battle during the evening performance. In the course of this battle, Mr. Brownlee was supplied with a torch to light fireworks bombs which had been put in tin cans in the ground. He says that as he fired one of these bombs, it exploded immediately the torch was applied, instead of taking a few seconds before the lighted fuse hit the powder, and as a result he got the full force of the explosion in his face.

Mr. Brownlee's left eye was so badly injured that there was no hope from the first that it could be saved. Yesterday morning it was removed. The right eye was damaged somewhat by the powder, but there is every indication that no serious harm has been done to it. He also suffered some cuts on his face.

The many friends of Mr. Brownlee were sorry indeed to hear of the misfortune. He is now getting along very nicely.—Hanover Post.
