
It takes three to complete a telephone call: the operator, the person calling and the person called. If any one of the three is at fault, the call fails.

Uncompleted telephone calls are a serious public problem. We call attention to it, because we want you to have the best possible service at lowest possible cost.

Every day in Ontario and Quebec there are over one million local telephone calls which are blocked — a waste of two million minutes a day — a congestion of traffic — a source of irritation — a handicap to perfect service.

Joseph Rusk Armstrong

The people of Markdale and vicinity were shocked, on Monday afternoon, September 11th, upon hearing of the sudden and untimely death of Mr. Joseph R. Armstrong, a member of one of the pioneer families of the district. Mr. Armstrong was engaged with his son, Nelson, loading a wagon with bags of oats when in a sudden seizure he fell from the step on the box and was dead when picked up. Dr. R. L. Carefoot was called immediately; but he was beyond all human aid.

The late Joseph Armstrong was 60 years of age and had enjoyed good health until a few months ago, when his heart began to cause him some worry. He was a devoted Christian gentleman, highly esteemed and well and favorably known in the whole community. He was a member and an official of Annesley United Church and deeply interested in its every activity. He was also a member of Markdale Public School Board and took a keen interest in matters of education.

The deceased was the third son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Armstrong and was born on the farm where he passed away. In 1907 he married Miss Henrietta Irwin, and they settled at Strongfoot, Saek, where they farmed until 1912 when they returned to Markdale and purchased the old Armstrong homestead. To Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong were born seven sons and one daughter, all of whom are most promising. He is also survived by four brothers and four sisters, namely: Mark, Charles E., and Herbert J. of Markdale; George W. of Peterboro; Mrs. R. C. Gregory of Toronto; Mrs. N. Campbell of Calgary, and Misses Sophia and Nellie Armstrong of Markdale.

In the passing of Joseph R. Armstrong Markdale loses one of its most useful and highly respected residents and the whole community deeply sympathize with the bereaved family in their great sorrow.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon. A private service was held at the home, after which a public service was held in Annesley Church conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. Newson St. John, and Rev. F. N. Bowes of Toronto, a former pastor. Interment was made in Markdale cemetery.


