## Why an Election This Fall?

After serving less than three years of a four year term; without a momentous question for the electorate to decide; without the slightest danger of defeat in the Legislature; the Government has asked and have secured the Lieutenant-Governor's consent to hold an election. Ontario people rightly ask why.

Two prominent reasons may be advanced:

1. The Government wishes to appeal to the people before a bad situation becomes worse. They see the handwriting on the wall in respect to Liquor Control Act; they know that more than 21,000 more permits have been sold in the first nine months of this year than during the whole of last year; they know that conditions are becoming worse; they know that when the Government control books close on October 31 they will reveal a vastly increased sale; they know that Ontario people will resent this and accordingly have an election day just one day before the books of the Liquor Control Act close.

2. The Government fears, too, for the stability of Ontario finances. Pledged to a promise of economy they have utterly disowned this plank and during the last five years the gross debt of Ontario has been increased from \$303 to \$394 million. Taxation has increased in the same period from \$4 to \$8 million, and with the new revenue from Hydro Tax and almost \$8 million dollars from Liquor it was just now stuck to balance the budget this year. The most casual glance will reveal the dangerous financial situation at the present time, a situation that prompts the Government responsible to appeal to the people before it becomes more precarious.

A Government, who are afraid to run their full course, for fear of what they will find at the end of the journey, should stand condemned.
