Thomas Frederick Wright

A deep shadow of gloom was cast over the community on Monday evening, September 16th, when it was learned that one of its most highly respected residents had passed away, in the person of Patrick Sullivan.

Although the deceased had been in poor health for the past five months, every hope was held out for his recovery until about two weeks previous to his death, when, despite the medical skill and tender nursing, he gradually sank.

Pat, as he was well and favorably known, was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Sullivan, and was of a very cheerful and engaging disposition, proving a true friend and obliging neighbour.

Twenty-five years ago on October 5th next he married Miss Julia Lister of Dornoch and the family had been looking forward to celebrating the Silver Wedding. The deceased leaves to mourn his loss his sorrowing wife, two sons and one daughter, Lister, of the Toronto Police Force; Bill and Alice at home; also seven sisters and brothers, namely: Mrs. John O'Hearn and Mrs. W. H. Martin of Toronto; Frank Sullivan and Mrs. John Sullivan of Detroit; Thomas, Miss Mae and James Sullivan of Toronto.

The deceased was a consistent member of the Roman Catholic Church, and the large cortege which followed the remains to its last resting place testified as to the esteem in which deceased was held. The spiritual and floral tributes were numerous and beautiful.

James Rutledge Pawcett

Another of the old and highly respected residents of Euphrasia township, in the person of Mr. James Rutledge Pawcett, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. E. Corbett, near Dundalk, on Thursday, September 17th. He had been in failing health for some time and the death was not unexpected.

The late Mr. Pawcett was born near Heathcote on June 18th, 1853, and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pawcett who came from Ulster County, Ireland. His early life was spent on the farm and later he learned the trade of carriage building which he followed for some years at Ravenshoe and later at Kimberley. He afterwards took up farming and contracting. He served as Councillor in Euphrasia for two years, was for several years a school

trustee and secretary-treasurer of the School Board at Kimberley. He was a Justice of the Peace for several years. In religion he was for many years a member of the Methodist church and later the United Church. He was a life-long Conservative, an officer of the County Association and an ardent prohibitionist.

In 1876 he deceased was married to Anne Elizabeth Soul and to them were born four sons and three daughters, two of whom, Margaret and Mary, died in infancy. Those surviving are Herbert at Collingwood; Robert in Toronto; Saul at Kimberley; Simon in Detroit, and Mrs. J. E. Corbett near Dundalk. Mrs. Pawcett passed away seventeen years ago. He is also survived by four brothers and two sisters, namely: Edward of Alliston; William and Irwin of Thornbury; John of Brandon, Man.; Mrs. Harry Down of Flesherton and Mrs. S. C. Rowe of Barrie.

The funeral took place on Saturday to Thornbury cemetery. The services were in charge of Rev. E. Baker of the United Church and Rev. A. A. Annand of the Presbyterian church, Dundalk.
