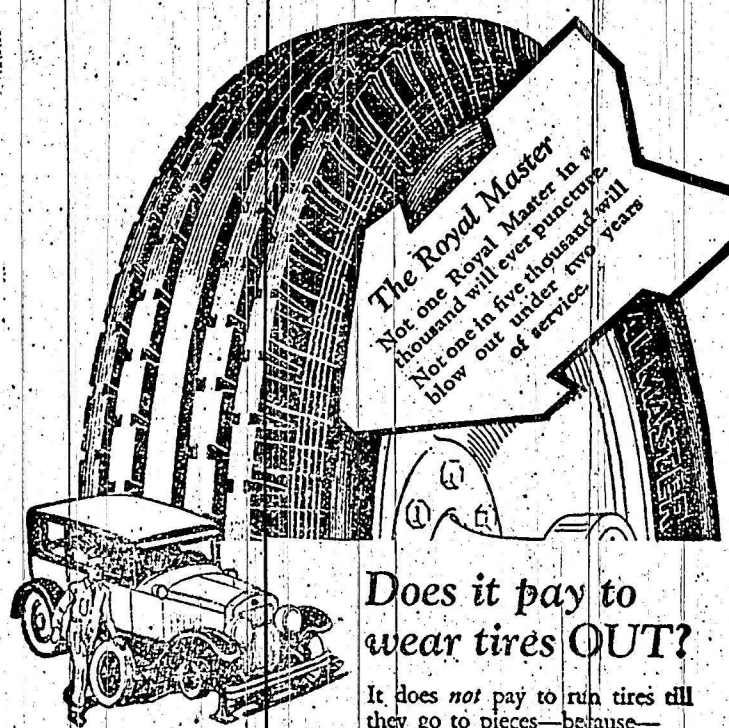

## The Late Mr. William A. Armstrong of Flesherton

Death came quietly on Friday evening of last week to one of Flesherton's most prominent and respected sons. Mr. Wm. Armstrong passed away at his home here, after an extended illness of three years' duration. While death was not unexpected by the family, it came as a distinct shock to the whole community.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon. After a short service was held in St. John's United Church, of which the deceased had been a prominent member, Rev. W. J. Scott, the pastor, conducted the service and preached a very comforting sermon, briefly commenting on the life and accomplishments of the departed. A quartette composed of Mrs. George Cairns, Mrs. J. Perkins, Mr. Markey and George Cairns, rendered a very beautiful and appropriate hymn. Interment took place in the cemetery in Flesherton.

The pallbearers were his brothers, Ernest, Bert and J. W. Armstrong, and James Alken, all of Flesherton. The casket was carried by a bank of friends from a host of friends. The flower bearers were all former employees of Mr. Armstrong and had worked along with him for years in his various enterprises.

The late Mr. Armstrong had great faith in the future growth and welfare of the village, and his faith found an outlet in the many works he took in order to build up the town with comfortable residences and business stores. In addition to his large jewelry store he also carried on an extensive lumber and pole business in Flesherton for the past forty years. His memory will always be kept green by the people of this district.

The late Mr. Armstrong, who was in his 72nd year, was born in the township of Arcomesta, and spent practically his entire life in Flesherton, where he had won the highest regard and deep respect of all with whom he came in contact. He had won a lengthy term of imprisonment at a position of trust and responsibility held by his father, the late J. W. Armstrong, of Flesherton.

The late Mr. Armstrong is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Jennie Cannon, two daughters, Mrs. S. E. Cumore of Montreal, Mrs. H. M. Hyland, Nipigon, and W. J. W. of Flesherton. Four sisters, Mrs. H. W. Hickling of Flesherton, Mrs. Frank Goff of Clarkburg, Mrs. Thos. E. Alkenhead of Toronto and Mrs. J. D. Clark of Weston, and three brothers, Rev. Bert Armstrong of Neoford, Dr. E. F. Armstrong of Cobalt, and J. W. Armstrong of Toronto, also survive.—Flesherton Advance.

## Mrs. John Hill Dead

Mrs. John Hill, widow of the late John Hill, both of whom were pioneer residents of this district, passed away on Sunday, Sept. 29th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harry Piper, at Ceylon. She was almost ninety years of age, and was a woman of strong vitality. Despite the infirmities of old age she retained her faculties in a marked degree up to the last.

The late Mrs. Hill, whose maiden name was Mary Copeland, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Copeland of Wexford County, Ireland, where she was born on Oct. 6th, 1839. At the age of nine years she accompanied her parents to Canada, settling in Leeds County. Ten years later, her parents having died, she came with relatives to Arcomesta township. Here she married the late Mr. Hill and they prospered on the farm. Mr. Hill died six years ago and a son, Asa, was killed when he fell in the barn three years ago. She is now survived by two sons and two daughters, namely: Mr. Silas Hill and Mr. W. H. Hill, both near this village; Mrs. Harry Piper at Ceylon, and Mrs. Rost G. Love at Dundalk. Fifteen grand children and seven great grandchildren also survive.

The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Tuesday at Markdale Cemetery. Rev. William Courts, pastor of the deceased, conducted the services at the house and graveside. He was assisted by Rev. W. J. Scott, United Church minister at Flesherton. The pallbearers were Messrs. J. B. Thibault, T. Gilchrist, R. W. Wilson, S. Homphill, W. J. McFadden and John Eagles.

Many beautiful floral offerings were placed on the casket.
