

Sunday School Lesson

October 13. Lesson 1—Keeping Fit For the Sake of Others (Temperance Lesson)—Dante: *Divine Comedy—Purgatory*. "Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost, which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body."—1 Corinthians 6: 19, 20.

INTRODUCTION—The Golden Text of this lesson provides a good beginning. Paul is urging the Corinthian Christians, most of them his own children in the faith, to avoid evil-doing of every kind. He warns especially against sins of the tongue, such as affect, brawling and envy. He takes high ground. "Know ye not," he says, "that your bodies are the members of Christ?" (1 Cor. 6: 15). And in our Golden Text, "Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost, which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own. When a man believes that with his heart he will endeavor to keep his body physically and mentally clean, he will endeavor to keep himself fit for the uses of the Master, as fit instrument for service to a temple for the indwelling of his Holy Spirit.

The figure is slightly changed in 1 Cor. 3: 16, 17, and Rom. 12: 4, 5. Here the Christian community is thought of as the body of Christ, just as the temple of God in which his spirit dwells. A apostle exhorts believers to keep this temple, the common life of Christ's followers, free from defilement, from "envying, and strife, and divisions" (v. 5), and as members of Christ's body to exercise our mutual gifts in harmonious co-operation, each desiring to serve the other, as all serve Christ. Compare also, 1 Cor. 10: 17; 12: 12-31; Eph. 4: 11-16; 1 Tim. 4: 12.

Ramsay MacDonald

The prime minister of England, controlling in some measure the destiny of the British Empire, is a central figure in the world outside his own party. He has an odd kind of genius. There is something mysterious about him. In his coldness and in his passion, in his touch of romance and in his logic and in his words. And his history is not "respectable" according to the usual English standards. It is not that he had to work his way up from dire poverty—everyone admits that MacDonald is a gentleman, even with a peculiar nobility of manner that makes other men around him seem indistinguishable whatever the length of their family tree. But he has always been feared as the intellectual advance guard of socialism. Then in 1914 he refused to give his vote for war, though he could have had cabinet rank in the coalition government.

Although an orator of some distinction, he has not the style of oratory the general public likes. He has not the large-hearted gifts which make a man beloved by the crowd. He has a certain shyness of soul which takes cover in silence, or in enigmatical smiles, or in escape to solitude. This aloofness, which makes him seem "queer" to some, is due to his intellectual upbringing. How, then, has he obtained his present office? He is not an actor, he is not a politician, he has been a revolutionary. Canada Can Boast 79 Radio Stations

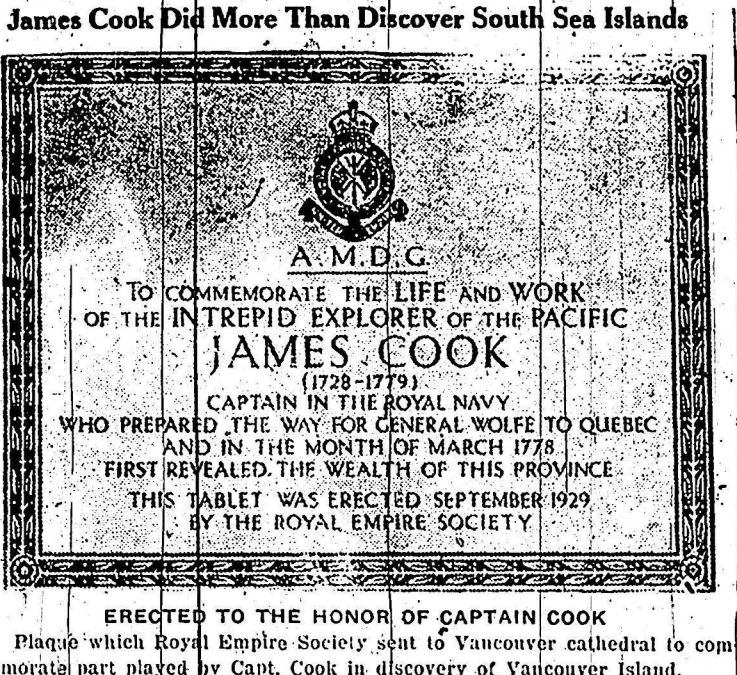
Private Companies Holding Aloof in Face of Report

MANY UNITS OMITTED IN GREAT WAR HONORS

Only 62 Units So Far Are Recognized in Honors Though Later List

If a unit leaving Canada, full of patriotic enthusiasm, was broken up in England so that less than 250 men were allocated to a battalion in France that original Canadian unit apparently will not be entitled to "Battle Honors."
It would appear that this is manifestly unfair, but units in Ontario not so recognized should await the supplementary list said to be under preparation.

The Department of National Defence has traced individuals of every battalion and knows what battalions participated in, with the result that many of these battalions have simply been awarded the battle honor "The Great War," plus a notation of the years in which the battalion was represented at the front. If a battalion had 250 men engaged in a certain battle, that counts as an honor.
