William George Acheson

Friday, October 11th, marked the passing of another of our highly esteemed pioneer settlers in the person of William George Acheson. Although in declining health for several years, the deceased had been going about until Tuesday of last week when he suffered injury from a fall. Following the shock to the system, pneumonia developed. The most attentive nursing was of no avail, and death came very peacefully on Friday morning, in the presence of the assembled family.

Born at Calderon on Nov. 21, 1851, he came as a babe of two years, with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. William Acheson, to Lot 205, Range 2, Archeson, a later the family moved to the farm now owned by Aaron Jordan at Inislogie. In 1863 they came to Lot 205, Range 3, Proton, where the deceased lived until his marriage in December, 1886, to Jane Alvira Duncan. With his bride, he settled on Lot 210 of the same range, where there was then a clearance of only a few acres. Here they endured much of the hardship and toil of pioneering, and spent their entire married life.

Mr. Acheson was a life-long supporter of the Conservative party. From early manhood he was a member of the Methodist Church, and daily he read and meditated upon the Divine Word. He was an affectionate father, a kind and loving husband. A man of quiet, unassuming manner, he yet was one whose sterling, upright character will ever remain an inspiration to honorable, noble living.

The funeral, held from his late home on Sunday afternoon, was very largely attended by sympathizing friends. Rev. E. Baker, of Dundalk, had charge of the funeral services. In the home his message of comfort to the sorrowing family was based on the 23rd Psalm. At the public service in Bethel Church, he spoke with much feeling, taking as his text the words: "When last I was gleaned today?" (Ruth 2: 15).

The beautiful floral tributes consisted of: Standing wreath, from the wife and family; sickle and sheaf, from brothers and sisters; arched sprays, from nephews and nieces; basket of church contributions from the Bethel community.

The pall-bearers were: Christie Johnson, Wilbart and a son, and son John A. McMillan, Will and Gordon. The funeral services were held at the funeral home, Gordon Duncan, Strongman, McMillan and Gordon Acheson, all of whom are nephews of the departed.

Mr. Acheson's death is the first break in the family line. He is survived by his devoted wife, and family of four sons and five daughters, as follows: Harold and Pallis at home; Ernest on the adjoining farm; Austin in Toronto; Eva (Mrs. Robert Cole), Swigley; Louise (Mrs. Newton Bannon), Dundalk; Margaret (Mrs. William Johnston), Harkaway; Flossie (Mrs. Wilfred Inkster), Warden; and Lillian (Mrs. Archie Cameron), Woodbridge. Three brothers and three sisters also survive, namely: John, James and Robert of Proton Station vicinity; Mrs. Margaret Duncan and Mrs. James McMillan of Bethel district, and Mrs. George Hutchinson of Kimberley. Two sisters, Mrs. C. Johnston and Mrs. Edgar Duncan, predeceased him.—The Dundalk Herald.

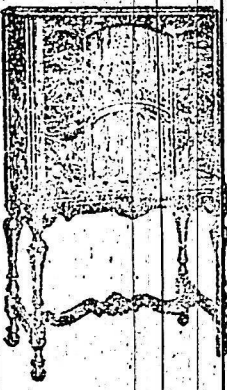
