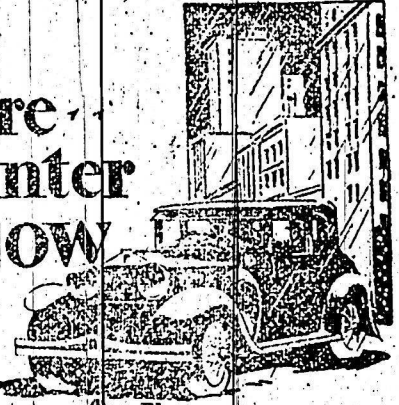

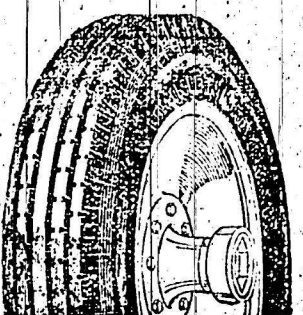

### Fatal Accident

Elmer Hutchinson Accidentally Shot on Monday

Elmer Hutchinson, only son of Mrs. Edith Hutchinson of this place, was instantly killed Monday afternoon when he and two chums, Alvin Noble and Gerald Kilpatrick, were shooting at a target in the vacant lot at the rear of Knarboro Hall. They had been shooting for some little time and Alvin Noble was in the act of firing when Elmer ran across in front of the rifle and the bullet entered his breast close to the heart. He was carried to the home of Mr. James Magee close by but death had been almost instantaneous. Dr. Carefoot called Dr. Bibby, the coronor, who empanelled a jury and after they had viewed the remains adjourned until Friday, November 22.

The accident has saddened the whole community and much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Hutchinson and Miss Nina in their affliction. Elmer was popular with all classes and was highly esteemed. He was of a sunny disposition, always cheerful and happy and for that reason was nicknamed "Sunshine." He was in the second form at High School and took an active part in all the school's activities in the line of sports and otherwise. He was a member of the Anglican Church, the A.Y.P.A., Sunday School and the Boy Scouts. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon from the home of his mother. Service was held in Christ Church, conducted by Rev. O. O. Pherrill assisted by Rev. A. Newton St. John, Pastor of Annex Church. The pupils of the Public and High Schools attended in a body and marched from the church to the cemetery where the remains were laid to rest beside his father who passed away some years ago. Mr. Elmer's father, John Noble, Bob Perry, Bob Duggan, Geo. McCallum and Geo. Colgan acted as pallbearers. Floral offerings were placed on the coffin by many sympathizing friends.

### Weber - Quinton

A quiet and pretty wedding was solemnized at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. R. J. Quinton, at high noon on Saturday, November 20th, when his second daughter, Grace Lucell, became the bride of Conrad J. Weber of Kitchener. Rev. J. R. Wilkinson of Temple Hill officiated. The bride entered the drawing room leaning on the arm of her father and stood under an arch of evergreens decorated with white bells, while the wedding march was played by her sister, Florence. The bride looked charming in a dress of ivory crepe with shoes to match. The young couple were unattended. They left amid showers of confetti for Meaford where they took train for Toronto, Windsor, Detroit and other points. On their return they will reside at 93 King Street West Kitchener.

### Department of Agriculture

Markdale, Ont., Nov. 12, 1929  
An open letter to myself from Miss Macphail appeared in last week's issue of this paper. I regret exceedingly that the point of contention is evaded.  
In the Flesheron Advance under date of October 16 the correspondent from Eugenia reported the meeting correctly as far as I know except the statement that "Mr. Stewart, assistant to Mr. Cooper." At that time Mr. Stewart was not employed by our department, as his services as a Judge at the School Fairs were completed.  
The issue of the Flesheron Ad-

...vance of October 23rd contains the article referred to. The extract in question is repeated as follows: "Miss Macphail mentioned the matter of a speaker from the Department of Agriculture at Markdale on the platform at Eugenia in the interests of the Conservative Candidate. She thought that the Department was free of politics and particularly keen on keeping their skirts clean." "Way did Miss Macphail deliberately evade this statement in my letter of the October 21st issue? If the meeting was wrongly reported, why was the correction not made immediately after the October 23rd issue of the Flesheron Advance? In the open letter to me later? I can only presume it is correct as stated; therefore something should be done to clear the Department of Agriculture at Markdale of suspicion. I regret the necessity of this controversy but had it gone unchallenged the staff of Grey County Branch of the Department of Agriculture would have been deemed and declared guilty of a contravention of the Civil Service Act. Not alone that, but suspicion of our work would prevent us—who know not party, creed or nationality—from securing the most effective results in the County. Our aim is to serve the farmers to the best of our ability all over the County of Grey. We want to help them and to perform most effectively the development of Grey County. Insinuation creating suspicion must therefore stop. If Miss Macphail is fair a retraction should be made.

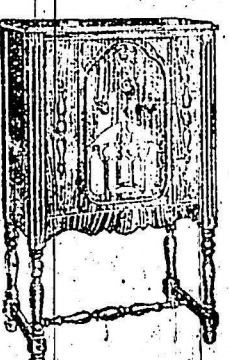

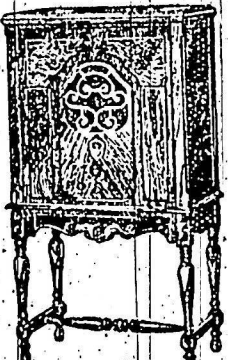

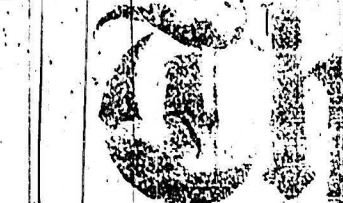
