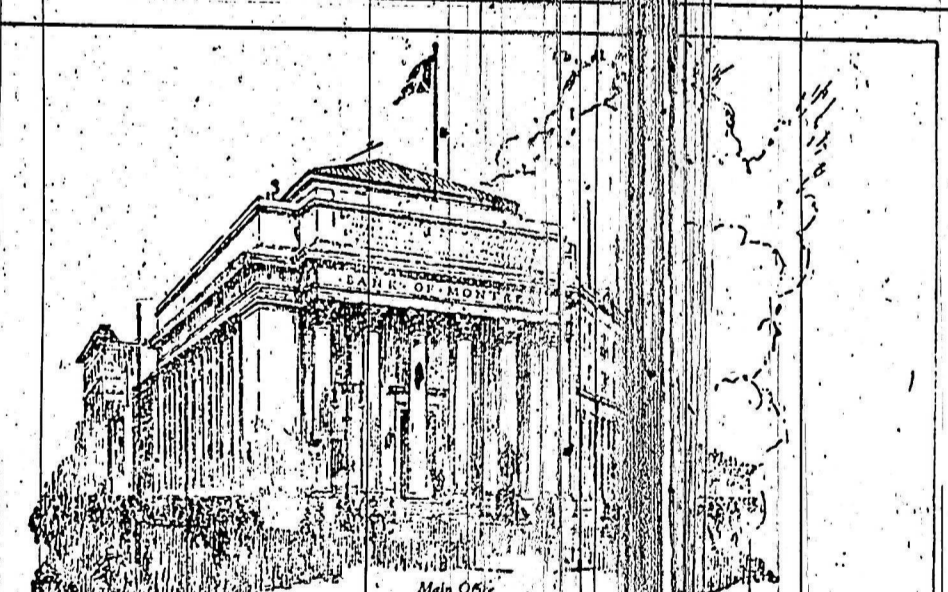

West of the Great Lakes

THE growth of the Bank of Montreal, coincided with the gradual development of Canada from a small colony to a great Dominion.
