West of the Great Lakes

THE growth of the Bank of Montreal coincided with the gradual development of Canada from a small colony to a great Dominion. In the Bank's westward advance to the Pacific Coast, one of the important links in its transcontinental chain of branches was formed in 1873 at Winnipeg, when the Bank opened its first office west of the Great Lakes.

This forward step, taken seven years before transcontinental communication was opened up between Manitoba and Winnipeg, made available to the immigrants on the prairies the stabilizing factor of a strong, conservative and at the same time enterprising financial institution.
