Match Company's Loan to Germany

Agreement With Swedish Match Monopoly Officially Announced

LONDON.—Practiced negotiations for a big loan to the German Government by the Swedish match interests, under the arrangement of a match monopoly in Germany, have been concluded.

It is officially announced that an agreement has been signed between the German Government, the Swedish Match Company, and N. V. Financiële Maatschappij Greengruber and Toll whereby the sole rights in Germany for the sale, export, and import of matches, has been transferred to a special monopoly company for a minimum of 32 years and a maximum of 50 years.

The period is dependent upon the time of repayment of a loan of about \$125,000,000 granted to the German Government by N. V. Financiële Maatschappij and Toll.

Half of the capital of the new monopoly concern will be held by the Swedish Match and the International Match Corporation and half by German factories and the Reich's Kreditanstiegsellschaft.

Match Prices Raised

The Swedish Match Company, in which there is a big interest in England, controls as before, about 65 percent of the German match production and the German factories about 35 percent.

Initial match prices, however, will be raised from 5 cents to 7 cents per package of 10 boxes.

The monopoly company will pay a fixed dividend of 8 per cent, while the German Government will receive a fixed sum of 13% per cent of 10,000 boxes. Any excess profit is divided equally between the Government and the Swedish interests.

To \$125,000,000 loan to the German Government bears interest at 6 percent and is to be repaid at the price of 95 percent. It takes 10 years. The conversion of payment is subject to the Reichstag and to German acceptance of the loan.

caught out without their rubbers, they can change. It is courting trouble to spend the whole day with wet feet.

(4) Do not allow yourself to become run down. Get plenty of sleep, exercise regularly, drink plenty of water and eat nutritious, health building food.

(5) Keep the windows open. This applies to winter and summer. Every one should sleep in a room where the air is fresh.

(6) Watch the thermometer. Rooms that are overheated are because of more colds than that are underheated. If the place where you work is not as well ventilated as it should be, and there is nothing you can do to ameliorate conditions, take a few minutes off now and then to go outside and sit for a few hours with fresh air.

(7) Avoid drastic changes of temperature. If you have been perspiring, allow yourself to cool off gradually. It is foolish to sit in the breeze or in front of an electric fan.

(8) When there is an epidemic, avoid crowded places.

(9) Wash your hands frequently. This is the best way to keep away from disease.
