Ontario Department of Agriculture

Cattle raising at large on the highways can be impounded and action taken against the owners.

Rate of Snowing: In an experiment conducted at O. A. C. for a number of years the results show that the greatest yield per acre with winter wheat was obtained from a sowing of 1 1/2 bushels.

Ontario's Big Share: Ontario makes a generous contribution to Canada's hog supply in 1928 the sales of this province totalled 115,821, or 41 per cent of the entire Dominion.

Personal Attention Needed: Among chickens as a whole there is a very high percentage of birds that are being raised in colony houses.

"Golden Age" for Hogs: The "golden age" of hog production is between the third and seventh months when the weight attained should be about 220 to 230 pounds.

Canadian Lamb-Eaters: Canadian lamb is a marketable product which is popularly demanded by the Canadian consumer.

Unfortunate Production: Unfortunately production and marketing of lamb meat is not so generally organized as that of the pig.

Ontario Tobacco Crop: Recent dispatches from New Zealand tell of a development in tobacco production on a large scale in what is known as the Nelson district.

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Exceeded 12,000 acres in 1928. Essex, with a similar total of 10,000 acres this last year, and Kent with 6760 acres, were the other principal tobacco growing counties.

Met at Township Hall on Friday, Nov. 15th, pursuant to statute. Members all present. Minutes read and adopted.

The following accounts were paid: Isaac Beatty, 1 sheep killed by dogs, \$12; C. McArthur, \$1.50 for inspection of fence; Reeve, Assessor and Clerk, \$1 each for service selecting jurors; Reeve, 1 day inspecting roads, \$3; telephoning jobs; J. McGirr, 1 day inspecting roads, \$3; telephoning jobs; J. McKeechie, 1/2 day inspecting roads, \$1.50.

McGirr-Boyd: That this Council confirm the appointment of Mr. John McKeechie (Glenelg) as School Attendance Officer for north half of Township in place of Mr. James Ledingham, resigned. Carried.

Boyd-Wright: That the Treasurer be authorized to accept the following sums of money: From Malcolm Black (timber from old McQuarrie bridge), \$11; From Joseph Koebel, error in September pay sheet, \$3. Carried.

According to By-law No. 715, passed at meeting of Oct. 5th, nominations are to be held on Monday, Nov. 25th, in Township Hall at 1 o'clock p. m. Elections if necessary on Dec. 2nd, holding places to be same as formerly. Deputy Returning Officers and Poll Clerks being as follows for the several polls: No. 1—Robert McPadden and Lawrence Chapman; No. 2—A. B. MacArthur and Mal. MacInnis; No. 3—John Varty and Frank Darcy; No. 4—Colin MacArthur and John Elison; No. 5—Geo. Black and John McGrath.

Attention of prospective candidates for offices of Reeve or Councillor for Glenelg is respectfully called to an amendment to the Municipal Act in 1923, whereby all candidates are required to present a certificate from the Township Treasurer showing that all municipal taxes on property of which he is owner or tenant in the Municipality are paid.

ARTEMESIA COUNCIL

This council met at the hall, Flesherton, on November 15th. The members were all present. With the Reeve presiding. Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Sheep claims ordered to be paid: Ross Stevens, \$12 one sheep; Dever Bros., one killed \$12 one injured \$5; W. Taylor, one sheep killed \$12; Dan McGeoe, one killed \$15; Lorne Atkinson, 1 killed \$10; A. Genoe, one killed \$15. By-law 833, 4 appoint D. R. O's. poll clerks and places for holding elections, viz: W. J. Beatty and W. G. Howles at Orange Hall; E. Wickens and W. Harrison at Township Hall; George Lillio and R. Rannon at Conley's house; F. Colinson and J. Stewart at Orange Hall; W. R. Meads and Herman McLean at McLeans house; W. Beattie and E. Waring at Foresters' Hall; W. Gordon and C. Graham at Orange Hall; H. Fisher and L. Lyons at S. No. 3 were passed.

Davis — Whitaker — That Road Supt. Patton's report No. 11, be adopted, showing expenditure of \$1,455.32.—Carried. Whitaker — Davis — That the matter of Township Proton and Artemesia be referred to Messrs. Corbett, Whitaker and the Superintendent

for settlement.—Carried. Whitaker — Davis — That Jas. Turner be paid \$10 for moving threshing machine in 1928, the bridge being unsafe.—Carried. Corbett — Davis — That the offer of the Flesherton council for the use of hall for nomination be accepted and this council wishes to express its thanks for the offer.—Carried. Corbett — Davis — That a vote be submitted to the ratepayers at the next municipal election on the question of "Shall we revert to statute labor."—Lost. The Council adjourned.
