#### ARTEMESIA

In Artemesia the race was for the two big chairs and Herb Corbett and Jack Davis are the popular choice of the electors. Alex. Cameron, last year's Reeve, was Corbett's opponent and put up a good fight to retain the seat. Corbett was Deputy-Reeve last year. Jack Davis and I. B. Whitaker both members of the Council for several years, tried for the Deputy's chair and the former won by a majority of 12. The vote stood:
