### The Late Bart Wright

Following a short illness, Reeve  
 Bart Wright, a prominent citizen of  
 the town of Chesley, died early Thurs-  
 day morning, Dec. 5th, a victim of  
 pneumonia. The late Reeve Wright  
 was born at Markdale in 1874, where  
 he spent the major portion of his  
 life. In 1898 he was married to  
 Sarah Baines of Markdale, and re-  
 mained a resident on a farm adjoining  
 Markdale until 1906, when he  
 moved to the 2nd concession, Eldon-  
 stie. Six years later he purchased  
 the furniture and undertaking estab-  
 lishment of Rowley and Savage, in  
 Chesley, and since then has been a  
 citizen of that town. His active in-  
 terest in municipal affairs found his  
 name associated with the various or-  
 ganizations. He was president of  
 both the Athletic Association and the  
 Agricultural Society and was largely  
 responsible for the successful erec-  
 tion of the Agricultural hall in Victo-  
 ria Park. Since 1918 he has been  
 a member of the municipal council,  
 serving as Reeve for the last three  
 years. He belonged to the I. O. O. F.,  
 and was a member of St. John's  
 United Church. He leaves to mourn  
 his loss, besides his widow, his son,  
 Clifford, associated with him in busi-  
 ness, and his two daughters, Hyrtle,  
 and Connie, of Ottawa and Toronto,  
 respectively. His three brothers, S.  
 H. of Markdale, T. S. of Wingham,  
 and S. P. of Portland Oregon, sur-  
 vived. The funeral took place on Sat-  
 urday afternoon at Chesley.
