The late Mr. Clark was born in Proton township 42 years ago, the youngest son of the late William and Mrs. Clark. As a young man he learned the barbering trade and conducted a shop in Dundalk for several years and then farmed in Proton township until he purchased the Wodehouse store about seven years ago. After giving up the store business he opened a barber shop here and later went to Erie, returning here about two years ago. He was married to Miss Martha Mills of Proton township about twenty years ago and she survives along with his aged mother, two brothers, Edward and William Clark, and one sister, Mrs. Sarah VanAlentine, all of Proton township.

A memorial service was conducted in Cooke's Church here Tuesday afternoon by Rev. Wm. Coutts, who was assisted by Rev. A. Mills. The body was then taken to Dundalk by C.P.R. train. The pallbearers were Messrs. Beryl McConnell, Newton Hutchinson, Gordon Wiley, Ed. Kleist, John Stephenson and Jack Colgan. On Wednesday afternoon the funeral took place from the home of his brother, William, to Ventry Cemetery and was under Orange auspices in charge of L.O.L. No. 797, Dundalk. He was a member of L.O.L. No. 1333, Vandeventer, and the members of that lodge attended the service here in a body.

The late Mr. Clark was a Presbyterian in religion and for many years was a member of the church at Ventry. While a resident here he attended Cooke's United Church. He was upright in all his dealings and was highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends. The writer had known him from childhood and we had always found him trustworthy and honorable. He was one of those whom we were always glad to count as one of our best friends and to his sorrowing wife, mother, brothers and sister we extend our deepest sympathy.

Arthur Foster
