About five years ago he went to Detroit to reside. He obtained a divorce and was legally married the third time to Miss Jennie Rowe, who feels keenly by the loss of a kind and loving husband.

He leaves also in sad bereavement four brothers and one sister, Wes. and Ed. of Toronto, Dave of North Bay, Will of the 3rd line and Mary (Mrs. Robt. McMaster) of Pfeffer-ton.

The remains were brought from Detroit to the home of his sister, Mrs. Robt. McMaster from where the funeral took place on Friday, April 11th, at 2 o'clock p.m. Rev.
