Parker, who for several years had conducted a store at Goring and who had been superintendent of the roads for the township for the past two years. He was taken ill about two weeks ago, and on the Friday previous was operated upon for an attack of acute appendicitis, but complications set in after the operation and he passed away on Thursday. The late Mr. Parker, who was very highly esteemed and respected by a large number of friends and neighbors who will greatly regret to learn of his demise, was 49 years of age. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Parker, formerly of Clarke township, near Bowmanville, but later of St. Vincent township, and he was born in Clarke Township.

Deceased was married in 1903 to Miss Emma Wood, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard Wood, of Goring, who survives, with a family of eight children, Mrs. Bruce Carruthers of Euphrasia Township, and Misses Elsie, Pansy, Alma, Jean, and Allison, Harold and Harvey, all at home. He is also survived by two brothers, George B. Parker of Owen Sound and Herbert E. Parker of Goring. One sister, Mrs. W. J. Wood, died in January. Deceased was a prominent member of the Orange Order, being Financial Secretary of Euphrasia District and Treasurer of L.O.L. No. 1295, Goring. He was a member of the Ebenezer United Church at Goring.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon to Ebenezer Church cemetery. Service was conducted in the church by Rev. Mr. Pettig, who was assisted by Rev. J. R. Wilkinson and Rev. W. G. Wakefield. 
