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
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Mr. J. A. Parker Dead

He was taken ill about two weeks ago, and on the Friday previous was operated upon for an attack of acute appendicitis, but complications set in after the operation and he passed away on Thursday. The late Mr. Parker, who was very highly esteemed and respected by a large number of friends and neighbors who will greatly regret to learn of his demise, was 49 years of age. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Parker, formerly of Clarke township, near Bowmanville, but later of St. Vincent township, and he was born in Clark Township.

Junior Farmers' Competitions

Many new features are to be carried out in Grey this year.

Trophies for Community Leaders

Ten boys from Grey County—16 to 20 years of age will win the free trip to the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto this fall. Why not? Last year 500 boys from Ontario stayed at the Royal Hotel for four days. They were entertained by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, the city of Toronto and the Royal Winter Fair Executive. It was a great education and entertainment for them. Ask any of the thirty boys who have won the trip.

A judging competition will be held in Markdale on Saturday, June 28th. The ten boys, 16 to 20 years of age, in this competition will be given the free trip. To be eligible for this competition the boys must take part in one of the Profit Competitions or be a member of the Owen Sound Boys' Potato Club. These Profit Competitions are open to boys 14 to 20 years of age.

The Baby Beef Competition Calves born after Sept. 1st, 1929 may be entered. They should be fed and cared for by the contestants and an account kept of all kinds and amounts of feed fed. The calves will be judged in November 1930. 75% given for type, quality and finish; 20% for lowest cost per pound gain and 5% for best kept records. If 5 boys enter and 3 complete, one free two weeks course will be given at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. If 8 enter and 6 complete 2 free courses will be given as prizes.

The Field Crop Competition At least five acres of oats must be entered in this competition. An account must be kept of labour, cost of seed, fertilizer etc., and also the yield of the crop. Fields will be judged in the summer. 20% given for greatest net profit per acre; 20% for field score. If six entries are secured and four complete one free two weeks course, railway fare, board and lodging will be given at the College at Guelph. If 12 enter and 8 complete 2 men will be awarded the prize.

Feeding Hogs for Profit Competition Each contestant must feed a pen of hogs containing not less than four. They must notify the Agricultural Representative when the hogs attain the age of 6 weeks. An account must be kept of kinds and amounts of feed consumed. The contestant must notify the Agricultural Representative one week before the hogs are to be shipped. Entries close July 1st, and all records must be completed by November 25, 1930. 60 points given for high net profit per hundred weight of gain; 20 points for best records; 20 points for type, finish, etc. Prizes will be given as in the above competitions.

These competitions should be Community Junior Farmer projects. To encourage Community Leaders to give prizes consisting of free transportation and accomodation at a two day conference at Guelph will be given. A week while program will be provided. The Department of Agriculture at Markdale is offering free help to any leaders or boys
