Depraved Appetites

Cattle eating boxes, steels, stones and other foreign substances are giving a lot of trouble to Grey County farmers. It is due to lack of minerals in the food and therefore that feed should have the deficiency supplied. To those who are having trouble the following is recommended: Bone meal or bone flour, 40 lbs.; salt, 10 to 25 lbs.; iron sulphate, 5 lbs.; potassium iodide, 3 to 4 ounces. "Dissolve the potassium iodide in a pint of water. Mix with salt flour-
