

Western Canada Produces Gasoline

Almost Inexhaustible Supply Can Be Obtained from Oil Sands—Will Make West Independent of Fuel.

Ottawa—Gasoline in almost unlimited quantities can be economically produced from oil sands in Southern Alberta. Announcement of this discovery was made by Dr. E. H. Domes, director of the Alberta Institute of Petroleum Research, in a report to the Canadian Council of Scientific and Industrial Research.

The discovery was made by the late Dr. E. H. Domes, who was killed in a plane crash in 1927. His work was continued by Dr. J. H. Ross, who has since taken over the work.

The discovery is of great importance to the West, as it will make the region independent of fuel. The oil sands are found in the Athabasca region, and are estimated to contain 100,000,000,000 gallons of oil.

The process of extracting the oil from the sands is simple and economical. It involves heating the sands to a temperature of 300 degrees Fahrenheit, which causes the oil to separate from the sand. The oil is then collected and refined.

We shall, however, not assist in the growth of the British Commonwealth of Nations. In our growth toward full stature of nationhood, we have strengthened the ties of friendship and tradition which bind us to the motherland and to other nations of the Empire.

Chimney Clock Towers

A Giant Barometer, With Thermometer, Beside It; Completes a New Factory Idea

Town-planning experts will not allow factories to disfigure the towns of tomorrow, so work designers have to produce factories that are pleasant to the eye.

There have been several ingenious attempts to do this recently. The most effective is at the Chiswick Pulley Works, London, where they have put up a factory chimney unique in Britain.

What might have been an eyesore has been transformed into a pleasing tower, designed on elegant but simple lines, in the modern manner. The novelty is that on three sides of it are large clocks, and on the fourth side a plant barometer. With a huge thermometer scale covering the same wall, the two instruments are the largest in the country.

The barometer is nine feet in diameter, and the thermometer scale, underneath it, occupies thirty feet of the tower's total sixty feet, and is seven feet wide. Its figures, painted white, are ten inches high, so that they can be read from a distance.

Triumph For British Enterprise
