The funeral of the late Mrs. Thomas Cooke, who passed away on Monday, June 23rd, took place on Friday afternoon and was largely attended. Following a short service at the house a public service was held in Annesley United Church of which the deceased was one of the most prominent and helpful members.

Rev. F. N. Boyes, a former pastor, was assisted in the service by Rev. Wm. Coutts of Cooke's United Church.

"I have fought a good fight; I have finished the course; I have kept the faith," was the text chosen by Mr. Boyes and a more fitting text could not have been chosen.
